Yorktown Advances to Class A Final, Gets 100th Win for Coach Rescigno

Carmel Advances to Class AA Final for 1st Time Since 2008, Powerhouse New Ro' up Next

It was just two weeks ago when Carmel Coach Todd Cayea recorded the 150th win of his 25-year career along the Rams' sideline, and it took just 15 years for 1995 Carmel graduate and YORKTOWN Coach, Mike 'House' Rescigno, the former All-NYS twoway lineman, to notch the 100th win of his Cornhusker career.

Rescigno's Huskers (8-1), the No. 5 seed, won the battle within the trenches in Friday's Class A semifinal victory, handing defending champion John Jay-Cross River (8-1), the No.1 seed, its first loss, 20-7, the Indians' second loss in two years.

"Great players, great families, great assistants... I've been so blessed," said Rescigno. "That's all it is."

It is way more than that: It's a phenomenal leader of men along the highest rank. It's a head coach that works as hard as any to gain an edge. It's a respected mentor with a connection to student athletes; those who play for him and those who simply roam the hallways and attend classes. It's the linking of players, staff, administration and families, which is the foundation of great programs. Mike 'House' Rescigno brings it all.

'Coach 'House' is an exceptional football coach, but an even better human being," said former All-Section Husker and current Notre Dame lax star Jose Boyer. "He never once points the finger at anyone but himself. He never takes credit, when he deserves all of it. He is one of the most selfless and humble people I've ever met in my life. I wouldn't have been the football player I was without him, but I would certainly not be the person I am today if it weren't for his role in my life. His 100 wins is obviously an incredible milestone, but he's positively impacted the lives of hundreds of young men, which I know means way more to him. Also, I can almost guarantee he celebrated

his 100 victories by preparing and watching film for win 101."

As for win No.100, Cornhusker senior RB Dylan Smith, who leads the section this season with 1,468 yards (10.4 per carry), led the way with 34 carries, 200 yards and two touchdowns, enabling Yorktown to reach its third Section 1 final in four years.

"Our boys came ready for a fight," Rescigno said. "Our kids play emotional. They have a sincere passion for this family. Honestly, they fight for each other like they are blood. There were kids on that field that willed themselves to fight through pain and physical exhaustion. I can guarantee you one thing: Our guys don't ever stop. You can count on that. I am so proud of their relentless attack and leadership. This is a special group."

Yorktown, the state runner-up in 2017, will have to go through third-seeded Rye, to win its sixth sectional title since 1993. The two Class A perennial powers will kick it off Friday (7:30 p.m.) at Mahopac High School

for the right to represent Section 1 in the state tournament. Rye, a six-time sectional champ since 1993, knocked off secondseeded SOMERS, 28-20, to advance.

The Yorktown game turned on the dime when Smith trucked a Jay DB from two yards out for the game's initial score with 10:18 left before half. On the ensuing kickoff, fiery Yorktown senior Dean Patierno gathered a fumble, caused by senior Evan Makar, and scooted 38 yards to paydirt for a 13-0 lead just 12 seconds later.

Yorktown's defense was at its best: The Huskers limited Jay's up-tempo, hifalutin attack to just 136 yards from scrimmage. Yorktown LB Benjamin Robinson picked off Jay QB Luke Mercer just before halftime. DL Johnny Bowen recorded a sack, and his mates put relentless pressure on Mercer, who entered the game with some gaudy stats (963 rushing yards with 17 TDs and 874 yards passing with 13 TDs).

"Our defense played lights out," Rescigno said. "The game plan was phenomenal. I need to credit our players and my staff. Their effort is literally unmatched."

Yorktown's O-line - Eddie Capone, Gerald Gentile, Jack Tinari, Matteo Cermele, Mike Benzinger and Johnny Bowen - won the battle up front, and will have to do so again against a Rye team that held Somers to 213 yards from scrimmage.

Additionally, the Garnets (8-1) gave senior QB Declan Lavelle a clean pocket all night, limiting Somers to just one sack and a couple of hurries. If Yorktown can't get pressure on Lavelle, it could be a long night. Lavelle turned the Somers game in his favor with a late first-half TD drive, capped by a 30yard, jump-ball scoring toss to WR Matthew Tepedino into triple coverage, which turned a 13-point deficit into a manageable 20-14 halftime score. Rye went on to score three unanswered TDs in all, two in the pivotal third quarter, while holding Somers to one continued on page S-3

first down, including a crucial 4th-and-one stall on Somers' 34-yard line with 2:50 to play.

Somers looked like it was in control before the final Garnet drive of the first half, leading 20-7 when WR Kenny McGrane and QB Jackson Kossow hooked up a nifty 10-yard connection with 35.6 seconds left in the half. Somers senior RB Charles Balancia got the Tuskers on the board first, jetting in from 39 yards out at 8:40 of the first. Lavelle answered to tie the score at 7-all and Kossow gave Somers back the lead, 14-7, from two yards out with 5:31 till half.

"We played our hearts out, but we simply fell short of our goal for the season," Balancia said. "The momentum switched on us going into halftime and when it looked like we were going to pull away with the game, penalties killed us."

CLASS AA

No.2 **CARMEL** played a complete game in every phase of football in its 48-7 Section 1 semifinal stomping of No.3 Spring Valley Friday. The Carmel Crazies were out in

force, watching senior RB James Cox steal the show. Cox rushed for 200 yards and three touchdowns and senior QB Andrew Nunez ran for one touchdown and threw for another as Carmel moved on to its first sectional title game since 2008 against state-ranked (No.3) New Rochelle, arguably the best football program in the state.

Carmel's offense chewed up chunks of yards, 455 in all, 316 on the ground. Cox took a pitch 49 yards for the game's initial score and followed with a 24-yard TD jaunt. He then plowed home from four yards out, set up by a 39-yard pass from Nunez to WR Colby Opromola (65 yards receiving, 1 TD). Carmel senior RB/WR Alex Beauchesne scored a 10-yard run after he'd hauled in one of four catches for 66 yards from Nunez. Beauchesne totaled 91 total yards rushing and receiving. Zach Aiello scored the Rams' other touchdown on a six-yard run.

The key for Carmel against New Rochelle will be a strong start; either by limiting New Rochelle on offense or matching them score for score, which isn't likely, so the Carmel

defense, like it has all season -- while holding teams to an average of eight points per game -- will need to find another level.

The four-time reigning champion Huguenots have copped the Class AA title 13 times since 2000, including five of the last seven while the Rams haven't challenged for the sectional title in over a decade (2009) and last won one in 1998.

"My kids are on a mission," Cayea said of the Rams.

His kids have been fueled since a seasonopening loss to John Jay-East Fishkill, a game in which the Rams, winners of eight in a row, were half the men they are now.

"We're definitely ready for the moment," Carmel TE/DE Will Boalt said "There's a lot of hype surrounding both teams, but we're just going to prepare as hard as we possibly can and come out on Saturday with a purpose."

Lakeland Sticks it to Somers, Wins 11th Straight Title

It is only a matter of time before **LAKELAND**'s offense starts clicking.

SOMERS found itself in a great situation at halftime of the Section 1 Class B Field Hockey Championship title game, trailing by one goal.

Not many teams were within one goal of Lakeland at halftime throughout the season. The Tuskers' defense held Lakeland at bay, but the top-seeded Hornets came out buzzing in the second half.

Lakeland scored four minutes into the second half and went on to a 4-0 victory over second-seeded Somers.

Lakeland has now won 11 consecutive Section 1 Class B titles. The Hornets, now 17-1-1, host Section 9 champion Rondout Valley in the regional final, 2 p.m., Saturday, Nov. 9. The winner advances to the New York State final four, Saturday-Sunday, Nov. 16-17, at Williamsville North High School (Section 6). Lakeland will face the Section 5-Section 6 winner in a semifinal, Saturday, 3 p.m.

"Not being able to finish in the first half was very frustrating," senior and Captain Jenna McCrudden said. "Having so many

opportunities and not being able to capitalize is unlike us. In the offensive circle we needed to be scrappy and score off rebounds, deflections and tips. I think after halftime, we shifted our mindset to scoring off chaos in the circle and not a big shot from the top."

Keira Ettere scored Lakeland's first goal

of the second half. She finished with two goals and Emma Fon and Lauren Salazar each had one. McCrudden registered an assist.

Lakeland had defeated Somers, 9-0, during the regular season.

In the second half of the season, Lakeland faced adversity with a 1-0 loss to Dexter (Mi.) in the Max Field Hockey National Invitational. Lakeland then rallied from a two-goal halftime deficit to earn a 3-3 tie with 2019 Section 1 Class A champ, Horace Greeley.

"The score of the Greeley game didn't accurately describe the game," McCrudden said. "We possessed the ball most of the game and we had more opportunities.

"Losing to Dexter was also frustrating because we had so many opportunities and couldn't finish. We out-cornered them and kept possession most of the game. Games like this taught our team way more than any win taught us

this season. We learned from the loss and tie and we know what it takes."

McCrudden celebrated a fourth sectional title and she said the feeling does not get old.

"It's rewarding to work hard all year and finally get to be in that dog pile with your team," McCrudden said.

Lakeland is focusing on Rondout Valley, but it also knows two more wins and that would lead to a

rematch with Garden City (Section 8) in the final. Last year, Garden City used

a second-half goal to shock Lakeland, 1-0, ending Lakeland's nine consecutive state championships.

"We are so beyond excited to be back in regionals," McCrudden said. "If we were to face Garden City, again, I know we are capable of being successful if we capitalize on corners and opportunities."

Lakeland advanced to the final with a 6-0 win over No. 4 John Jay-Cross River in a semifinal. Last year, Lakeland defeated John Jay in the Section 1 Class B final.

Somers has always had the misfortune of being in the same league as Lakeland, and, most recently, John Jay-Cross River.

This year, the Tuskers broke free of John Jay, finished second in the league, behind Lakeland, and earned the second seed in the Section 1 Class B Field Hockey Championships.

Somers finished with a 12-4-3 record and reached the Section 1 Class B championship game for the first time since 2002. That year,

Somers, led by Sarah Shute and Katie Flynn, won the Section 1 Class B title and advanced to the state final four.

"Yes, we went into sectionals feeling very strong and happy with our placement," said senior Erin Clark. "We felt we were working very well as a team and worked extremely hard in the practices leading up to sectionals.

"We felt we were playing some of our best field hockey against Lakeland," Clark said. "At the half being down one we knew we had to keep up the intensity for the rest of the game. Their first goal of the second half did not affect our mindset. We knew we had to continue playing our game and not let the score get to us.

Clark has committed to attend SUNY-Oneonta and will play field hockey. Even though she is graduating in June, Clark knows the team will continue being successful.

"I think after this season the returning players next year know what they need to continue to work on and we have some great players coming up to varsity next year," Clark said. "I have faith they will continue to build on to what we accomplished this year."

Hendrick Hudson Wins 15th Section 1 Title Since 2000 Yorktown, Lakeland Knocked Off in Class A Semis

When **HENDRICK HUDSON** and John Jay-Cross River played in September, the fans were treated to a five-set epic in which the Sailors prevailed.

Going into the Section 1 Class A Volleyball Championships, John Jay and Hen Hud were seeded first and second, respectively. As a result, it appeared the two teams were on a collision course to meet in the final.

Hen Hud and John Jay did not have it easy as the Sailors dispatched a dangerous YORKTOWN team, seeded third, in the semis. John Jay faced LAKELAND for a third time this season and beat the surging Hornets, setting up the Class A final at Pace University's Goldstein Center.

In the highly-anticipated title match, second-seeded Hen Hud showed why it was undefeated and the defending champion.

Hen Hud swept John Jay, 25-20, 27-25, 25-23 to win Coach Diane Swertfager's 15th Section1 championship since 2000.

The Sailors, now 21-0 this season, will play the Section 9 champion, Wednesday, Nov. 13, 7:30 p.m., at Kingston High School. The Section 9 Volleyball Championship begins play, today.

"I definitely think that this time around we were much more prepared, and focused," said senior and Captain Callie Pidoriano. "We had been preparing all season for this game against John Jay."

Following the first-game victory, the teams were locked in a nail-biting second game. John Jay held a 25-24 lead, but Hen Hud would not be denied. The Sailors maintained their composure and fed off their fans' enthusiasm.

"After taking the second set I think we gained more confidence which helped us gain control early on in the third," Pidoriano said. "We had a lot of support from our fans

this game, and we were all very excited and Also, making it as far as eager to play this game. John Jay has a lot of talent and they definitely put up a great

Winning a second consecutive sectional title is just as sweet for Pidoriano and her teammates, especially the seniors.

"It feels amazing," Pidoriano said. "It's definitely the best feeling in the world."

The Sailors now have 10 days off, which can be viewed as a positive and negative.

"It's definitely nice to rest, recuperate and prepare for the next match," Pidoriano said. "It's a little longer than we could have wanted though because we are really on a roll right now so he faster we play the next opponent the better.

'That being said, I am not worried because we have had this much time without a game before and it is sometimes refreshing.

Either way, Hen Hud will be ready because it does not want a replay of 2018 when Cornwall upset the Sailors in the first round of state play. This came after Hen Hud beat Cornwall in a tournament during the regular season.

"Last year's upset was devastating for us, so I think we really remember that feeling and it drives us to work harder," Pidoriano

Yorktown had its outstanding season come to a close in the Section 1 Class A semifinals to Hen Hud.

The Cornhuskers finished with a 15-5 record, the third seed in the Section 1 Class A Volleyball Championships and the knowledge that everyone returns in 2020.

"After winning out first two sectional matches, we realized how much potential we have for next year," said junior Olivia Waschenko. "In the history of Yorktown volleyball, this year was one of the strongest records we've had which is so rewarding, especially with us being such a young team.

the semifinals was a huge accomplishment and we are proud of ourselves."

Yorktown advanced to the semis with a 3-1 victory over sixthseeded Eastchester in a quarterfinal match. The Cornhuskers rang up 18 service aces in the match.

"We put so much work in this season and we're very satisfied with the result of being in the final four. These achievements prove that our program is growing and we are excited to see how the 2020 season will go," Waschenko said.

"We're all super excited to be returning with the same team next year. This will be a very strong advantage for us and we can't wait to see where we end up. Most of us will be working very hard in the off season so we can't wait to see how much we all improve, as a whole.'

Yorktown, along with league foes Lakeland and John Jay-Cross River made the final four showing how deep, talented and competitive

"We definitely have one of the most competitive leagues in the section and we've had it for years," Waschenko said. "I think it's very good practice to be in a competitive league because you won't get any better unless you play good teams.'

Lakeland had another strong season under veteran coach Steve Fallo's guidance.

The Hornets finished with a 15-6 record, including a berth in the final four where they lost, in four games, to top-seeded John Jay-Cross River.

Lakeland, seeded fifth, earned a berth in the final four by rallying from down two sets to overcome fourth-seeded Tappan Zee. Last year, Lakeland lost in the first round of sectionals after winning the first two games.





Ossining Crowned, Somers Downed in Section 1 Title Tilts Pride's Evans Notches GWG in 79th Minute, Ends 41-Year Drought

Nothing is given, everything is earned when it comes to the Section 1 Class AA boys' soccer playoffs, and so Ossining's first sectional title since 1978 was more than deserved, given the field of fiery competitors it had to go through. The top-seeded Pride's 2-1 championship win over No.2 Mamaroneck came courtesy of Kevon Evans' second goal of the game in the game's 79th minute at Lakeland High School Saturday; a tally in which he out-willed four Tigers defenders.

One year after losing to RCK in the 2018 sectional finals, Ossining (17-2-1) has ended the drought that dated back to the Jimmy Carter era, the 39th President of the United

State-ranked (No.7) Ossining will face Section 4 winner Corning-Painted Post in the regional semifinal Wednesday, Nov. 6, 1:30 p.m. at the swaggy Wright National Soccer Campus in Oneonta.

After Mamaroneck (17-3) took a 1-0 lead, Evans answered back quickly with the equalizer with 8:28 left in the first half. Pride G Carlos Zabarburu (8 saves) laid out for two crucial saves down the stretch to keep the

score even.

But it all came down to the foot of Evans, the hero of the day, after scoring the two goals in school history, which

came about through years of preparation by committed Coach Joe Scamarone and many others within the Ossining soccer community.

"Last year, we made it to the finals, too, but a lack of experience hurt us," Scamarone said. "Winning the championship didn't happen overnight. We've been working and preparing our players and teams for years through our local programs; starting from our partnership with Ossining AYSO that leads directly into our most prominent local club program Munay Soccer Academy, which we started many years ago. This feeds directly into our high school program.

"This process takes time and patience," he added, "but the importance is developing our players from a young age. Other schools have seen this system and are beginning to do the same, because they see the results.

In the soccer world, you cannot expect results coaching players three months out of the year. Preparing players must be done year round, and this is why we were able to achieve a successful

Dippolito made it a 2-2 game early in the second half, fueling short-lived hope. Several coaches on hand afterward felt

that if the Tuskers and Garnets played 10 times, they'd split the series 5-5. Fourthyear Somers Coach Brian Lanzetta was not among them.

"I think we scored quality goals, I think we played with high intensity and I think we did our jobs," said Lanzetta, who took issue with several questionable calls. "I'm just disappointed in the outcome because I think we are the better team and I'm sticking by

We're sticking to this: Somers, which defeated Pearl River, 4-2, in the semis, will be back here next year with yet another title drive in mind.

Class AA Mahopac, Class A Somers Fall in Title Tilts Haldane Wins 9th Straight Class C Title Behind Two Rowe Goals

The magic came to an end for Class A SOMERS and Class AA MAHOPAC Sunday evening at Arlington High School where both girls' soccer programs suffered season-ending losses in their respective Section 1 championship games after fairytale semifinal triumphs to advance.

"They played outstanding and definitely deserved to win. I'm not going to make any excuses but we're pretty banged up. I don't know if it would have made a difference, they were that good today. They gave us nothing, nothing and the lack of speed killed us.

"But I couldn't be more proud of the run they got on," Saia added. "Even down, as they were, they never quit and kept coming back. Even the bench was alive. Just an

Bella Monteleone added two assists for the nine-time defending Section 1 Class C champion Blue Devils (10-5-3), who advanced to the state tournament to face Section 9's Seward in a regional final on Tuesday, 4 p.m. at Middletown High School. Haldane reached the state semifinals last season and continues to represent Section 1 in the finest fashion.
