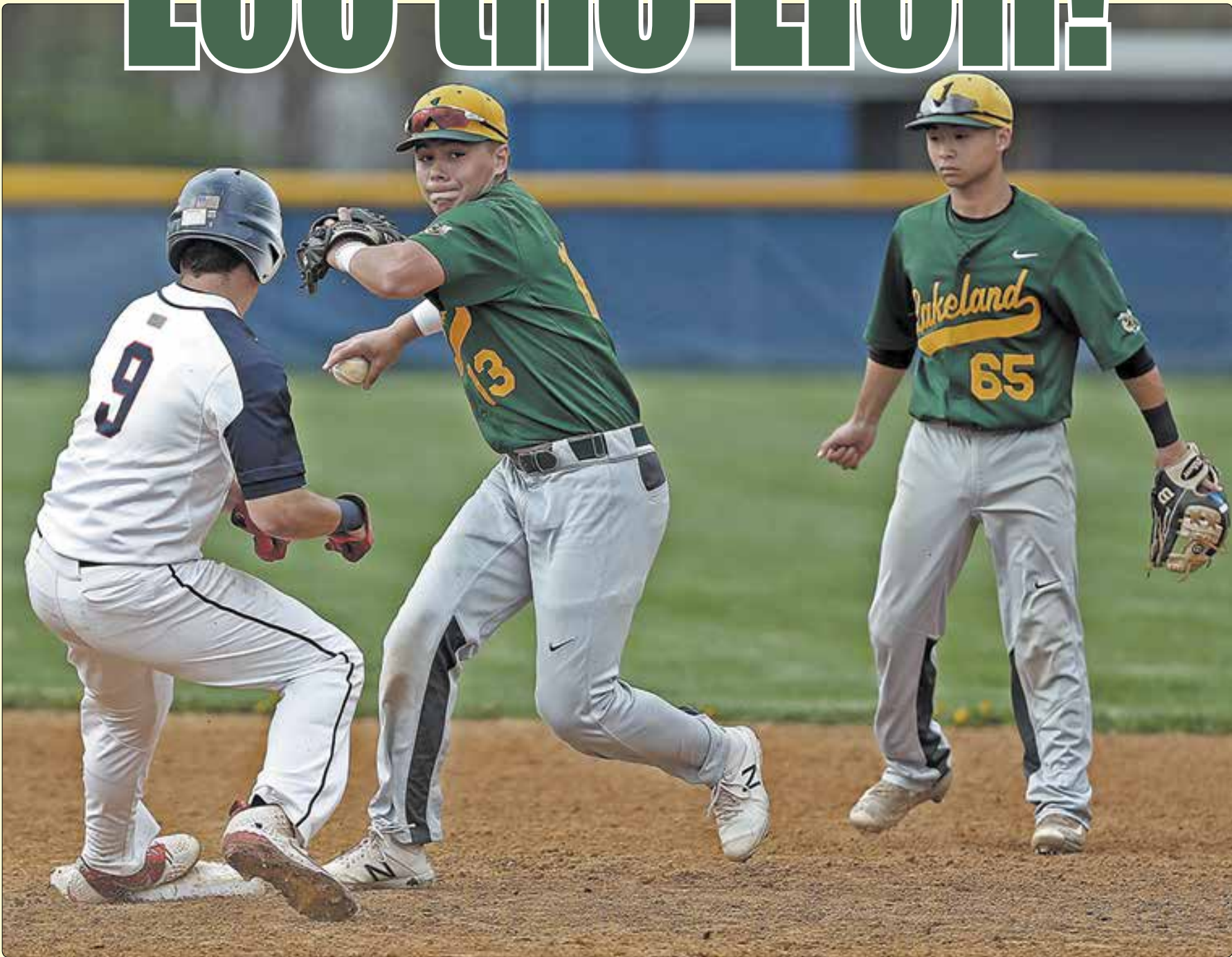

State-Ranked (No.1) Lakeland Mops up Byram Hills in Title Rematch

If LAKELAND RHP Jason Green can do what he did last Thursday night in a 9-0 win over host SOMERS, the defending Section 1 Class A champion Hornets (8-1), ranked No.1 in NYS, are going to be tough to beat come playoff time. Already armed with the reigning Class A Player of the Year in gas-chucking junior lefty Joey Vetrano, and stacked at No.2 with crafty lefty Evan Berta, Coach Bill Casey now finds a gas-throwing No.3 in Green, who went the route against the Tuskers, allowing just one hit while whiffing nine and walking one.

Berta (2 for 3, HR, 3 RBI, 2 RS, BB) and Vetrano (2 for 4, 2 runs, double) provided all the support Green would need with Somers' Thomas Parisi reaching twice and breaking up a no-hit bid. It was all Vetrano to open the week last Monday in a rain-shortened 6-0 win at Peekskill Stadium where Joey Bats chucked five shutout innings with seven strikeouts for the win and went 2 for 3 with a solo dinger.

Berta was sensational a day later when he shut down a quality Byram Hills club to secure the complete-game, 6-1 vic-

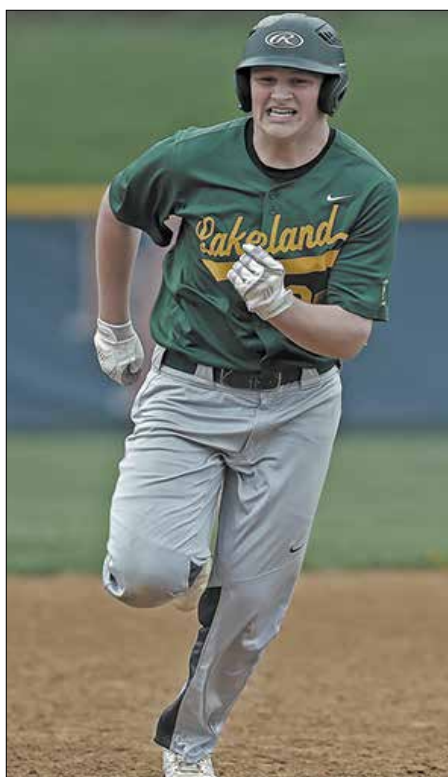

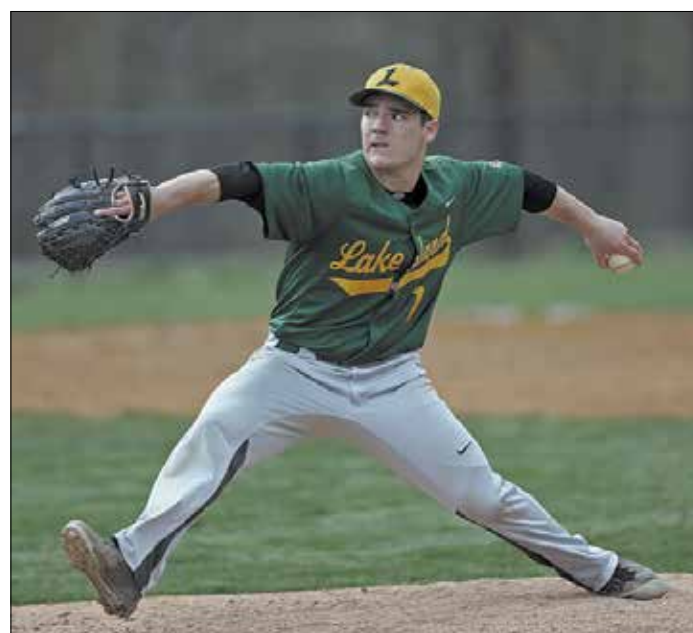
But Brewster wasn't done yet; during a busy week of action, the Bears also mauled Ardsley, 5-1, in the opening round of the Ardsley Tournament last Saturday. RHP Thomas Mark went the distance, allowing one earned with seven whiffs for the win. Big Nick Girard was 2-3 with a double, dinger and two RBI for the surging Bears, who also saw McBride and Gergely knock in a run.

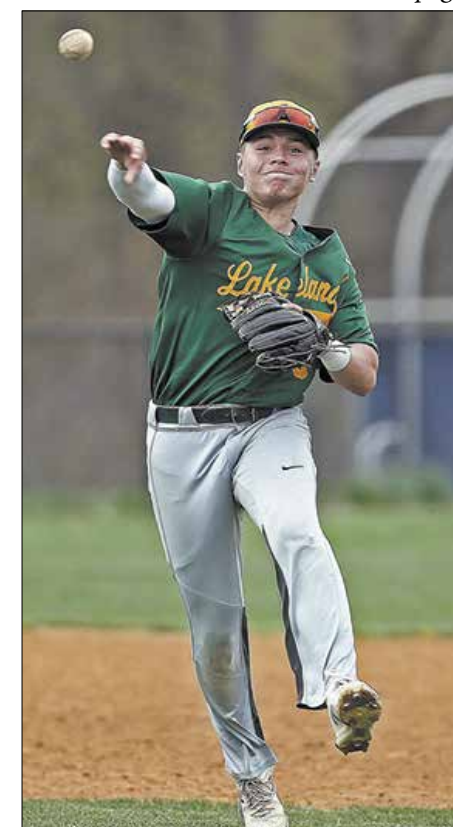

Somers (5-5) also posted a 10-0 rout of Croton-Harmon (4-5) when co-ace Jackson Kossow pitched 4-2/3rds of one-hit ball and struck out eight. The Tuskers blew the floodgate open with 10 runs in the fifth inning behind Thomas Parisi (2 for 3, 2R, RBI) and Logan Carriero (2 for 3, 2RBI, R).

BREWSTER has a solid week of action, doing so in

fancy fashion when pitchers Bobby McBride and Austin Beal combine for a no-hitter in the Bears' 4-3 win over Nanuet. The bats of Paul Catalano (2 for 4) and Jack Gusler's game-winning two-run homer were all starter McBride and reliever Beal would need to accomplish the deed.

The Bears (8-2) followed that up the next day with an 8-4 win over visiting PANAS behind P Ryan Gergely, who went six innings for the win, allowing two earned runs. Reliever Dean Johnson closed. The free-spirited McBride was big again, mashing a game-winning grand salami in the bottom of the sixth. Jack Gusler (2 for 3, 2 RBI) was also big for the Bears.

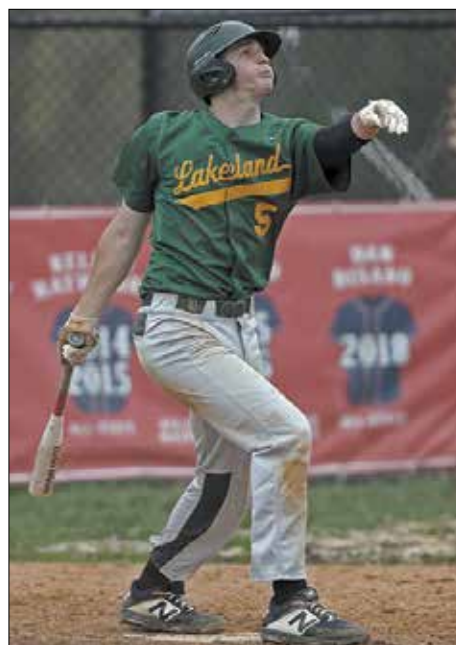

is: Just look at their past precedence as No.17 seeds in two of the last three years and the significant post-season runs made by Coach Matt Cunningham's Bears.

"The kids are playing at a high level right now, but I really believe it's our resiliency that is a hallmark trait," the coach said. "We have been down in games this year, 9-1 Beacon, 3-0 Nanuet, 4-3 Panas, and the guys don't panic. There is a prevailing thought that someone will make a play, get a big hit or have a shutdown inning that

will allow us to win the game."

The pitching staff, led by the gas-twirling, UConn-bound McBride and Mark, have kept the Bears in just about every game.

"Our pitching staff has done a very solid job up to this point, really keeping us in games and allowing us to be successful," Cunningham said. "This team is very enjoyable to work with because of their posi-

tive attitude and willingness to sacrifice for the team. We have a difficult schedule on the horizon and we are hoping that we can keep playing well in order to put ourselves in as good of shape as possible in a very competitive Class A."

Class A is as strong as it's been in quite some time with Lakeland, Rye (No.2) and Byram Hills all ranked among the top 13 in NYS, so league and sectional titles will be hard to come by.

Panas (5-5) bounced back nicely in the opening round of the Dom Cecere Tournament at Eastchester in a 2-1 win over New Rochelle behind emerging junior chucker Matt Calise, who lasted 5-1/3, allowing one run on four hits. Closer Don Hopper got the win while Lucas Feliciano went 1 for 3 with a double and a run. Adam Elfadel was 1-3 and scored the winning run with some nifty base running.

HEN HUD lost a close one to a quality Rye (13-1) club, falling 4-3 to Garnet ace Declan Lavelle, who fanned 12 Sailors. The Sailors (9-3) also defeated Croton, 8-5, behind the combined efforts of pitchers Nick Caruso, who got the win, and closer Nick Hiltsey with the save. Hen Hud has had a terrific regular season run over the course of the last four-five years, but they need a deep post-season run one of these years.

"We've got three big challenges this week with Brewster and Lourdes (twice) on the

schedule," Sailor skipper Van Vourliotis said. "We're looking forward to continuing to play our best baseball come May 1st and into the rest of the month."

YORKTOWN (8-4) took a 7-0 loss to league rival John Jay on the chin but bounced back nicely in an 8-1 win over Beacon, who had no answer for slugger Anthony Fusco (3 RBI). Chris Sica, Kyle Zaslaw (RBI) and Luan Biberaj (RBI) all had two hits to lead Huskers, who saw P Joe Lombardo earn the victory, going five innings, allowing one run on four hits. Vincent Cicatelli threw two innings in relief out of the bullpen, fanning a pair and notching the last six outs to earn the save.

Fon-tastic Hornets Beat Brewster, Somers, off to 11-0 Start

Coming into the 2019 varsity softball season, **LAKELAND** senior p Claire Fon explained what the team hoped to do.

"Our goal was to start out strong, taking it one game at a time," said the five-year varsity player.

Lakeland could not have asked for a better start. Through 11 games, not only have the Hornets started strong, they are a perfect 11-0.

The Hornets added victories over Pelham (9-5), **BREWSTER** (16-1) and **SOMERS** (4-3) during spring break week.

The fast start is nothing new for a Lakeland program that has been a perennial Section 1 Class A finalist or semifinalist the last 10 years.

Lakeland broke through and won the 2017 Section 1 Class A title and last year, lost to eventual champion, Ardsley, in a semifinal.

The semifinal loss last year left Lakeland unfulfilled so the Hornets were determined to raise their level of play in 2019.

"We have a very young team so working and improving on our communication

was our focus," said Fon, who will attend Adelphi University in September and continue with softball. "All of the girls on the team worked a lot during the offseason, which has definitely contributed to our great start. Every day we try to improve our skills and it shows on the field and in the box."

Lakeland has been a nightmare for opposing pitchers as the Hornets are hitting .389, led by Fon's .667 average. Krystal Badillo is batting .528 and freshman Shannon Scotto is at .441. Lakeland has 46 extra-base hits this season, paced by Fon's Section 1-leading 11 home runs. Overall, Lakeland has outscored its opponents, 124-28.

Lakeland steps into the box with one thought in mind.

"Our focus is to get on base any way possible," said Fon, who has a team-best 34 RBI. "Our lineup is strong one though nine so each player has an impact in each game."

One aspect that has made Lakeland effective with the bat is the communication between hitters.

"A major piece is adjusting to each pitcher you may face," Fon said. "Our team is good with communicating on pitches seen and how to adjust our swing."

Fon has been the beneficiary of this run support. She is currently 10-0, including four shutouts. Fon has 77 strikeouts in 64 innings and owns a 0.88 earned run

average. However, when called upon, Fon knows her defense will respond.

"Knowing that I have a strong defense behind me makes a big difference," Fon said. "They field the ball cleanly and make some very stand-out plays. I know that they have my back which makes pitching much easier."

Lakeland is gaining confidence with each victory, but the Hornets are remaining composed and not thinking about their record.

"We go into every game thinking our record is 0-0, as Coach Fallo says," Fon said.

Lakeland overturned a two-run deficit with a six-run sixth inning against Pelham. Fon homered twice and drove in four runs. Badillo doubled, had two RBI and scored two runs.

Ava Knopf smacked two doubles and drove in four runs against Brewster. Scotto, Badillo (two doubles) and Fon each had three hits and three RBI. Stella Bale allowed two hits and struck out a career-best 11 for her first win.

Amber Lopez collected two hits and a RBI and Badillo had a hit and two runs scored against Somers to back Fon's seven-hit, seven-strikeout performance.

SOMERS rebounded to beat Byram Hills, 2-1, behind relief pitcher Sarah Murphy. Murphy entered the game, with no outs, in the first inning and went on to allow four hits.

Hannah Recine had a double and RBI and Karly Moscarello also doubled.

PUTNAM VALLEY improved to 7-2 with an 11-2 triumph of Pawling. Emily McKenna was in control, allowing just two hits and striking out eight, also notching her 300th career K. She also slammed a two-run homer and added a three-run jack, finishing 3 for 4 with seven RBI. Putnam Valley rang up 14 hits, including 12 from its No. 1-4 hitters. This quartet also registered 10 RBI and scored 10 runs.

Alex Waters went 4 for 4 with two RBI, Keiko Waters had three hits and three runs scored and Frankie Reyes had two hits and an RBI.

Putnam Valley Coach Rena Finsmith credited infielders Kathleen Gallello and Reyes with some 'stellar plays in the field.'

Putnam Valley will be playing in the prestigious James "Ace" Morabito Tournament, which annually attracts the top teams in the state.

HEN HUD swept a pair of games -- over Rye and Poughkeepsie. Alana Espinoza blanked Rye on a four-hitter and strikes out seven. She also helped herself with two RBI. Jillian Attinelly drove in a team-best five runs in Hen Hud's five-inning win over Poughkeepsie. Nicole Kopfensteiner led Hen Hud with four hits while Kami Johannsen and Ella Kennedy each had three hits. Michaela Capicotto and Jessica Bleakley drove in

four runs apiece.

YORKTOWN went 1-1 for the week, losing 6-2 to Valhalla, then bouncing back to shut out Panas, 4-0.

Allie Cortino was brilliant against Panas, striking out 11. She received offensive support from Sam Riccardulli, Julianne Strauss and Kaitlyn Bennett, who all had two hits apiece. Alyssa Buck supplied the power with a two-run homer. Cortino had nine strikeouts against Valhalla along with two hits and a RBI. Strauss doubled and tripled and Riccardulli added two hits and a run scored.

BREWSTER dropped to 4-5 this season with the loss to Lakeland. Coach Lisa Delzio opened the season without her No. 1 windmill because of an injury. Early in the season, an injury sidelined Brewster's No. 3 hitter for the remainder of the season. Even though the Bears are not having a Brewster-like season, Delzio is getting contributions from her two upperclassmen leaders -- Caroline Cherubini and Madison Chiudina. Freshman Christy Restucci has also been a catalyst.

"Madison has been tremendous at the plate this season," Delzio said. "She leads the team in batting (.423), RBI (21), home runs (four) and slugging percentage (1.153).

"Caroline has been solid in center field and at the plate. She's been a tremendous leader on and off the field. With six freshmen on our squad and the injuries we've had, Caroline keeps everyone focused and gives 100 percent every day."

Previously unbeaten and state-ranked (No.2) **MAHOPAC** dropped a pair of close ones against perennial powerhouse John Jay EF.

Put Valley Hoping to Send Vandeveerdonk Clan Out with Bang

When it comes to PUTNAM VALLEY lacrosse, no family has had a greater impact than the Vandeveerdonk clan; three varsity careers spanning 12 years since the time Jimmy, Johnny and Joey joined the ranks. Living up to Jimmy's All-American status would never be easy for Johnny and Joey Vandeveerdonk, but they never stopped trying to fill those shoes of the brother who would eventually set the standard at Oneonta State.

Each of the Vandeveerdonk boys have been the go-to guy for their particular coach; whether it was Brian Kuczma, Tad Ignatz or Timmy Weir, but Jimmy's teams were among the finest in PV history. Johnny, who played at Georgetown, and Joey didn't have the supporting cast Jimmy did, when the Tigers were earning the last of back-to-back Section 1 Class C titles in 2010. But, to be fair, each "Vandy

Dude" has led by example as exemplary student athletes, and upstarts like recent champions Bronxville and Pleasantville were in their infancy stages when Jimmy was ruling the roost and PV was regularly battling Rye for Class C supremacy.

"They have all been tremendous people both on and off the field," said Weir, now in his third year at PV. "Joey is a role model for the program. He is so dedicated to his team and one of the hardest working players that I have ever coached. I know his brothers were in the same mold. His hard work and attitude will get him places in life. It has been an honor to coach Joey over the past three years. He is a great player and even a better person off the field. I'm gonna miss all the daily things he brings to the program."

The trio have meant more to Put Valley lax than any other family in the history of the program, which dates back to the wee-2000s when Kuczma, the former Yorktown High and Hopkins All-American long

pole took a start-up program to its first sectional championship in 2004, procuring the first team title in any sport in school history. Kuczma helped advance the careers of both Jimmy and Johnny -- who recently played internationally for the Netherlands -- and keeps close tabs on Joey, who is having a stellar senior campaign, leading the 8-5 Tigers in goals (36), points (45) and faceoffs (66%)

while being locked off by the top opposing pole on every team the Tigers face.

"Thinking back to all the boys, they are such unique players and each brought a little something different to their respective teams," said Kuczma, one of the top defenders in the history of U.S. Lacrosse. "Jimmy was a combination of speed and strength at the midfield. Johnny was an attackman with vision and a relentless dodger to the goal. And then Joey, who brings a combination of both brothers. One consistent truth about all of them, is their competitiveness and winning mindset. They have each cemented themselves as some of the greatest players we have had in the Valley."

It's been a dozen or so years since the Tigers were without a stately Vandeveerdonk brother on the field or within the confines of the program. It's safe to say that over that period of time, in which the sons of Tom and Sue Vandeveerdonk have become PV lax royalty, the Vandeveerdonks have meant more to the program than most, and a run to the Class D Final 4 this May would help cement their legacy...

I don't care what anyone says, 2019 is a down year for local teams north of the Pleasantville border... Class A's Lakeland/Panas and Mahopac and Class B's Somers are down by their high standards. Put

But Rebels can erase that notion with just one win – against either John Jay (today) or on Saturday by solving a Keith Boyer-led Yorktown defense in the most meaningful regular season game in Section 1 history.

No.3 MAHOPAC – Class A Indians (6-6, 6-5) were knocked off, 15-6, against state-ranked (No.20) Northport and will be in a battle with Wappingers, North Rockland, Scarsdale, Suffern and Lakeland/Panas for the No.2-3 seeds that will avoid Mamaroneck until the finals. In the meantime, this offense needs to fine-tune some things against Arlington, Carmel and Ossining this week before the regular-season finale against a stingy Wappingers outfit that balls out defensively like its coach once did #Kuczma. Lady Indians, a potential top-3 seed if they hold it together, are looking solid after beating Carmel and Lakeland/Panas #QualityWs.

No.4 SOMERS – Class B Tuskers (5-6) fell behind Yorktown 7-1 but showed some serious resiliency in the second half; the kind that might set themselves up for a Final 4 run in a Class B field that features Yorktown, John Jay and everybody else. Brandon LaSpina bagged a second-half hat trick while recent Lafayette-commit Nick Rossi finished with two goals and one assist. You know what's even sicker than anything: Somers has two former All-Americans – UPenn senior Gabby and Loyola sophomore legend Livy Rosenzweig – up for the Tewaaraton Award for college lacrosse' top honor. Man, no other way to say it: the Rosenzweigs are Somers royalty.

No.5 HEN HUD – Class C Sailors (6-4) are still in mix of Class C contenders, though current No.1 Byram Hills and No.2 Rye remain the teams to beat, but Connor Gallagher (6 points) and Bryce Caffrey (hat trick) ended a two-game skid in 13-4 win over Lourdes. Braden Ellis added two goals for the Sailors, who need a quality W before jump aboard #TheShip. The

Lady Sailors do indeed got it going on.

HM PUTNAM VALLEY – Class D Tigers (8-5, 7-5), the current No.8 seed, need to find their way to a Final 4 or bust, or this will be just another ho-hum campaign since 2010. Junior A Kyle Wassil (5G) had his way in 15-3 win over Ossining and Lucas Colavecchio added five points (3G, 2A), but the quality W's are lacking at this point in time.

HM CARMEL – Class A Rams (5-4) have posted semi-sweet wins over New Rochelle and White Plains of late, prior to losing to Arlington, but could you imagine the euphoria at the Our Lady of the Lakes – Council No. 6318 – Knights of Columbus if Caione's Rams could upset Mahopac this Friday night (7 pm)? #IDontThinkSo. The Lady Rams almost did the unthinkable by knocking off Mahopac and would love a playoff rematch.

HM BREWSTER – Class B Bears (4-7, 3-7) are the current No.10 seed, had no answer for John Jay CR in 14-3 loss. Any playoff win at this point would be gravy.

HM HALDANE – Class D Blue Devils (9-2, 8-2), the current No.3 seed, are envisioning a scenario where their athleticism, which is better than previous seasons, secures an opening-round playoff
