# Yorktown, Somers, Carmel Advance to Grid Final 4

# Husker RB Smith Grinds, Finds End Zone 4 Times in Rout of Brewster

Well, the Section 1 Class A grid scene played out just as many expected it would last Friday night; with top-seeded John Jay – CR, No.2 Somers, No.3 Rye and No.5 Yorktown advancing to this Friday's sectional semifinals, which produces two of the most appealing Final 4 matchup we've seen in quite some time. Only the big boys have survived to this point, including Class AA Carmel.

YORKTOWN upended BREWSTER, 35-7, in a game that, believe it or not, was closer than the final score would indicate. The Bears led 7-0 and stopped Yorktown – three and out – on the Huskers' first possession, but from that point forward there was no stopping Yorktown senior HB Dylan Smith, who was a blow-delivering delinquent and conjured up images of Huskers past; like he was Brett Makar-, Rob Anderson-, Pete Carriello-, Nick- & Paul Satavicca- and Donny Weese-good (sorry to leave out so many former greats, too many to mention).

Still, the score was 14-7 going in to the fourth before Smith piled on. Smith scored four touchdowns, on up-the-gut bull rushes and off-tackle trots and one spectacular jump-ball catch at the pylon.

"Dylan Smith is a dude, period," Yorktown Coach Mike Rescigno exclaimed! "We knew he was going to be special three years ago. He has a nose for this game, jets and the ability to run you over. He has great hands. Most importantly, he wants to be the

difference. Like I told Dylan at the end of doubles: Last year was a warm up, Section 1 will know your name very well, very soon."

Truer words have rarely been spoken as Smith presents a nightmare for opposing coaches; Jay boss Jimmy Clark, in particular. The Fairfield-bound Smith, a lax star by trade, finished with 202 yards on 22 carries for three scores, and snared a 31-yard house call from QB Trevvon Johnson, and had two sacks on the other side of the ball as the state-ranked (No.15) Huskers improved to 7-1, ready to take on reigning champion, top-seeded John Jay (8-0), ranked No.6 in NYS,

Friday (6:30 p.m.) in the semifinals.

"Smith played great," Brewster boss Ed Mulvihill said. "He's a tough runner with speed. He hits the hole quickly with intent! We had some shots early but couldn't connect. I thought our defense played great. If you told me it would be 14-7 in the fourth quarter, and we had the ball on the 37- yard line going in, I'd have taken that. It didn't go our way tonight, but I like the direction of the program and how our hard work in the off season is paying off now. We going to work hard this week to win our final game to top off a great season. Going in, we knew we'd have to play a perfect game to be in it. Yorktown has a lot of weapons. You

can't just focus on one or two guys."

SOMERS wasted no time in disposing visiting Clarkstown North, 35-0 in its Class A quarterfinal. Somers QB junior Jackson Kossow and junior RB Jack Kaiser each rushed for two touchdowns and Kossow threw another TD pass to senior RB Charlie Balancia (89 receiving yards) to open the scoring from 25 yards out. Balancia added 88 yards on the ground and the state-ranked (No.14) Tuskers improved to 7-1 and will host third-seeded Rye at 7 p.m. on Friday in the semifinals.

T.J. Deagan added 40 yards on two carries for the Tuskers while Nate Rosenzweig rushed for 35 yards on three totes.

Dom Cheek was a freak on defense for Somers, leading the way with 10 tackles, two for loss, and a sack while fresh freshman Jake Polito had five tackles, two for a loss, and a sack. Man, the Somers defense will be put to the test this Friday against a footloose and fancy Rye offense, and they will be the unit to determine whether or not Somers wins its fourth sectional title since 2012. Rye, ranked No.17 in NYS, entered the 2019 season as the favorites, according to many pundits/coaches/fans based on the play of QB Declan Lavelle. Somers entered the campaign as the Garnets' primary challengers, and he we are in the semis where something has to give.

"We can't wait, we're all so ready for this one," said Balancia, who missed the first

game between the two powers, a 28-24 come-from-behind Somers win. "It's going to be a wild atmosphere. I'm even more excited because I get to play them this time around."

In non-playoff games, PANAS (2-6) defeated Sleepy Hollow, 28-21, as QB Mark Perez threw for 194 yards, inching him closer to 1,000 for the season (971). HEN HUD (3-5) was shut out. LAKELAND (4-4) failed to manage host Clarkstown South.

# Somers Dispatches Yorktown, 7-1; Ossining Advances in AA

# Tusker Leitner Nets 5 Goals in 2 Playoff Wins; Pride's Lenaghan Tricks RCK

There's a reason why they Section 1 Class A soccer scene is blowing up in our neck of the woods: The committed coaches in places like Somers, Yorktown and Lakeland, among others, are stepping up to make a difference.

There was a time around the turn of the century when the locals couldn't take the field without flopping about, and chippy play was the order of the day, but nowadays the level of respect has seemingly hit new heights, despite the fact that No.3 **SOMERS** blew No.6 **YORKTOWN** away in Saturday's 7-1 quarterfinal blowout.

When coaches respect one another – like the guys from Somers, Byram Hills, Yorktown and Lakeland do – the players reflect it, for the most part. So, when Somers Coach Brian Lanzetta locked up in full hug with Yorktown Coach Ed Polchinski last Saturday after the Tusker blowout, the players on their respective teams understand that the rivalry steps back to the wee '90s when the two programs were squaring off in their former heydays.

There's a ton of history that the current players may or may not know about, including a run between 1989 and 1991 that saw Somers win a pair of sectional titles (1989-91) and Yorktown win another (1990), which, in essence, put the programs on the man.

Somers, winners of two of the last three Section 1 Class A titles, is on the verge of challenging for yet another crown after the thrashing of the visiting Huskers. Somers senior F Bennett Leitner has been on a mission since the playoffs started, scoring five goals in two wins, including a hat trick against Yorktown (13-5) and two more in a 3-1 win over No.14 Lourdes.

"He's been unreal," Somers Coach Brian Lanzetta said. "He's been great all season. His attitude, work rate and his focus is all amazing. He locks in and turns into a machine. What I believe sets him apart is his soccer IQ. He knows how to play the game. His first touch, off-ball movement are all up to par, like a professional."

The state-ranked (No.17) Tuskers (16-1) scored three times in the first 12 minutes and were never threatened as Ethan Cukaj, Drew Lasher and Leitner scored in succession. Yorktown's Timmy O'Callaghan broke up the shutout with a PK.

Somers will play at No. 2 Pearl River (16-

1-1) in Wednesday's sectional semis.

Yorktown worked a 2-1 OT win over No.11 Tappan Zee in OT when Jack Prybylski scored the game-winner for the Huskers. Husker George Popovic tied the score.

If there was any doubt about how tough Class A soccer is this season, take a look at what's left: No.1 Rye (17-1, No.6 in NYS), No.2 Pearl River (16-1-1, No.16 in NYS), No.3 Somers (16-1) and No.4 Byram Hills (16-2, No.20 in NYS), a combined 65-5-1.

No.12 **LAKELAND** was eliminated in a 2-0 loss to No.5 Nyack. The youthful Hornets are rebuilding their program one day, one practice, one game at a time. No.20

PANAS was shutout in a 5-0 loss to No.4 Byram Hills, which will host No.1 Rye in the other side of the semis.

#### **CLASS AA**

OSSINING's Nolan Lenaghan stated his case for Player of the Year in the top-seeded Pride's 5-1 opening round Class AA win over No.16 RCK last Thursday. The senior striker struck for the hat trick and the state-ranked (No.10) Pride advanced to the quarters, avenging last year's unfathomable 2-1 loss to R.C. Ketcham in the championship game a year ago.

The Pride then went out Saturday and knocked off a prideful No.8 White Plains program, 2-1, in OT. Jose Padilla scored in overtime for the Pride while teammate Andrick Palma scored the game's first goal. Pride G Carlos Zabarburu (5 saves) for Ossining (15-2-1), which will host No.5 Arlington Wednesday, looking to continue a three-year stretch that is likely the finest in Pride history, which includes just one sectional title in the late '70s.

Lenaghan and company will, fittingly, need to go through the Admirals, perhaps the top program in Section 1 the past decade.

No.13 **CARMEL** busted up one side of the bracket in a 3-2 overtime triumph of No.4 Horace Greeley. Ram Tayte Wong scored what might have been the biggest goal in the last decade, tickling twine and giving the Rams (9-8-1) their biggest win in recent memory, but Carmel was eliminated by No.5 Arlington, 4-0, in the quarters.

No.2 Mamaroneck crushed No.15. **MAHOPAC**, 7-0, as the Indians finished a ho-hum season at 4-10-2.


Somers took a 1-0 lead on a goal by Dahlia Pepe, but Hen Hud junior Kira Varada added to her school record (26 goals) to knot the

# Yorktown, Hen Hud on Class A Final 4 Collision Course

YORKTOWN opened its 2019 varsity volleyball season with a victory over 2018 Section 1 Class B champion Ardsley and little did the Cornhuskers know it would be good omen.

The Cornhuskers, without any seniors, went on to one of the most successful regular seasons in program history. Yorktown finished 13-4 and, as a result, earned the third seed in the Section 1 Class A Volleyball Championship.

Yorktown opened its quest for the title with a sweep of Clarkstown South, 25-13, 27-25, 25-20. The Cornhuskers hosted No. 6 Eastchester, Tuesday in a quarterfinal. A victory would send Yorktown into a semifinal matchup with undefeated and second-seeded Hen Hud, Thursday.

The final is set for Saturday at Pace University's Goldstein Center.

The seeds for the 2019 season were planted during the 2018 sectional tournament. Yorktown qualified as the 11th seed in Class A last year and upset sixthseeded Lakeland, after losing the first two games. Even though Yorktown was beaten by John Jay-Cross River in the quarterfinal round, the Cornhuskers were pleased.

We were down two sets and won the next three to win the first round of playoffs," said junior Olivia Waschenko. "It was so exciting and we felt on top of the world, especially our senior players. I was so happy for them!"

Even though Yorktown knew it without any seniors, the team was psyched for 2019 based on its promising finish.

"Although we didn't have any seniors coming into this year, we knew we had a very talented group of players and were excited to see if we would have a winning record," Waschenko said. "We were really looking forward to starting our season.'

"Winning our very first match of the season against Ardsley, last year's Section 1 Class B title champions, really contributed to our confidence and was the start of our big winning streak."

Yorktown has proven that senior leadership is not always necessary for a team to be successful. The Cornhuskers pride themselves on playing unflappable.

"I would attribute our calm and playing poised to the fact that we trust each other on the court," Waschenko said. "Another major factor that adds to our poise is Coach Kemp's calm demeanor on the sideline.

"We also remember that in the game of volleyball, you have to play one point at a time. This leads us to work hard for every

Somers, which is rife in soccer history, has been playing at a very capable level for much of the last decade, competing in six sectional championships, winning four sectional titles since 2010 (5 since 2006) and a state title in 2014, plus a NYS runner-up in 2011. However, unless the Tuskers can ramp up their sense of urgency in the next round, they could fall short of their lofty expectations.

Earning the third seed in sectionals, behind top-seeded John Jay-Cross River second-seeded and Hen Hud, was a surprise, but one Yorktown gladly liked.

"It is so cool that we are seeded third," Waschenko said. "We have put in a lot of work both during the season and the offseason. Our hard work has definitely paid off!

The dedication of both Coach Kemp, Coach Killeen, and Coach Sweeney also has a large impact on the way we play.'

Jackie Cane led Yorktown with nine kills against Clarkstown South and Allison Torres added six. Kills and five digs Allison Silverman finished with 11 assists. Olivia Fasce registered nine assists and also had six digs and five aces. Jackie Knoesel collected eight digs and Waschecnko added five kills.

HEN HUD, the reigning champs, completed an undefeated regular season -17-0 - and opened defense of its Class A title with a sweep of Beacon.

Despite an unblemished record and a victory over John Jay-Cross River, Hen Hud is the second seed behind the Indians.

Hen Hud hosted No. 7 Walter Panas in a quarterfinal, Tuesday. If the seeds hold true, Hen Hud will play No. 3 Yorktown in a semifinal, Thursday.

The Sailors closed out the regular season on a roll, including the Hall of Fame tournament (Massachusetts) championship.

'Winning the Hall of Fame tournament was an amazing experience and it definitely boosted our confidence as a team and reminded us that we can keep winning and take the sectional title," senior and captain Callie Pidoriano said.

One thing Hen Hud will never do is look past an opponent. Pidoriano and her teammates know what could possibly happen should they look ahead.

"As a team, we never overlook any team that we must face," Pidoriano said. "We stay focused on the team ahead because we know, and have seen before, that upsets happen all the time in volleyball, which is what makes

it so interesting. We never underestimate our next opponent and Coach Swertfager reminds us of this before every game."

Hen Hud and John Jay-Cross River fans would like nothing better than to see this final.

"We know that John Jay has a very talented team and program, but so do we so it would be a very competitive match that could go either way," Pidoriano said.

One year after being upset in the first round of the Section 1 Class A Volleyball Championship, LAKELAND was not allowing a repeat.

The Hornets, seeded fifth, made quick work of No. 12 Peekskill - 25-16, 25-19, 26-24 - in a first-round match. Lakeland, 14-4 this season, played at No. 4 Tappan Zee in a quarterfinal. Tuesday.

"Anytime you win a sectional game it is special because you get to play another game and have a chance to win the whole thing, Lakeland coach Steve Fallo said. "Peekskill fought the whole match and it was a good test for us. We need to bring our A game against a very good Tappan Zee team. Our team had a terrific regular season finishing 13-4. We play in one of the toughest leagues, which hopefully has prepared us for the tournament.'

Lakeland was fueled by Emily Kubicsko's 10 kills and 13 digs. Kayla Jennings delivered five kills and 10 digs, Caitlin Wisker contributed five kills and Victoria Tsui rang up 12 assists.

Two losses to conclude the regular season did not affect MAHOPAC as the 11th seed opened the Section 1 Class AA Volleyball Championship with a four-set upset of No. 6 Scarsdale, 25-14, 25-20, 20-25, 25-15. Mahopac played at No. 3 Arlington, Tuesday.

Arlington swept the regular-season set from Mahopac.

"It was a great win for the team," Coach Jay Melville said. "We have been competitive in a lot of our matches this year and kept coming up short. We really started to play well at the end of the season. Even though we lost to Arlington and Yorktown, I was happy with how the team played. We cut down on our errors and played better at the net.'

Colleen Kelly finished with 20 assists and nine digs for Mahopac, now 8-10 this season. Jenna Palmiero registered 25 digs and Gabriella Rocchio added 16 digs. Diana Kone had a team-leading 12 kills and also collected 10 digs. Caroline Feeley contributed nine kills and six blocks and Bella Marinelli also had nine kills.

We definitely played our best match of the season against Scarsdale," Melville said. "We had our lowest error total of the season." and also set a match-high total for blocks. Our aggressive play definitely carried us through the match.'

Even though Arlington took both matches from Mahopac, Melville said his team played much better the second time.


on. I know my mom is my number one fan, so every time I'm on the field I play for her."
