Put Valley's DeChent Banks 1,000 Points; Lakeland Flexing

Eva DeChent was not going to keep the **PUTNAM VALLEY** fans in suspense as she was closing in on 1,000 varsity points. The Putnam Valley junior entered last Tuesday's game against Haldane needing 16 points to achieve the milestone. By the end of the first quarter, DeChent gave her family and fans a chance to celebrate.

DeChent dropped in a layup for varsity points 999 and 1,000, joining Kelli Venezia, Kristi Dini and Ariana Stockinger.

"It was a great experience when Kelli and Ariana did it so I knew I wanted to do the same," said the five-year varsity player. "I received balloons and flowers and a bunch of posters from my family and friends."

DeChent finished with a career-best 39 points as Putnam Valley beat Haldane, 75-40.

"Getting my 1,000th point at home, and in a win, made it an even better accomplishment, and all the support and people there made it a great time," said DeChent as she eyes Dini's career mark of 1,396, which she did in three years.

Going into the game, DeChent was well aware of the scenario.

"I knew I needed 16 points and I wanted to do it in the first quarter so I was very focused on getting it done as quick as possible," Dehent said. "Once I reached 1,000, I felt a lot of relief because with Covid

and us never knowing when it could end the season, I was happy I was able to get it over with and now I can move on to new challenges."

First-year Putnam Valley Coach Don Hamlin was happy to see DeChent achieve the milestone.

"Eva is fantastic," Hamlin said. "She puts in the time and effort required to be special. She is a really great kid and will continue to improve and excel."

DeChent understands that it takes more than one person to accomplish any individual goal.

"My teammates played a big part in my 1,000 points and without them it would have never

been possible," DeChent said. "With all their support through the years and them giving me confidence when I was younger, they really helped me."

It has been a difficult first six weeks of the season for Putnam Valley as it has dealt with injuries, including to DeChent. However, Putnam Valley persevered and is

"So far, this season has been rough with the injuries, but I'm happy to see everyone is healthy now and we can get back in a rhythm, hopefully, and get back to the goldball game."

Yorktown trailed 32-24 late in the third quarter, Mundy said.

The action was fast and furious last Wednesday when league bouts tipped off all across the section and upsets – like HEN HUD's 52-49 win over host LAKELAND – was the stunner of the day. We said in our poll last week that when they put their best foot forward the Sailors are a blue-collar bunch of bad men, and Dean 'The Dream' Hiltsley was a very bad man for the Hornets to deal with. The senior guard had his way at the rim and finished with a career-high 26 points.

Junior F Xavier Juarez dropped a dozen on Lakeland while junior G Michael Gagliardi went for six. Sailor sophomore Gino Wamack scored five points, the last of which was the biggest of his young career, a game-sealing trey.

"In regard to the last play, it was great execution by the whole team" Sailor skipper Jordan Hirsch said. "Dean made a great read off the screen and Gino knocked down a really tough contested shot. I'm really happy for our guys to get some tangible results from the work they've been putting in."

Down 10 points in the fourth, Lakeland looked like it would cruise to victory.

"To beat a tough and organized team like Lakeland at their place isn't an easy thing to do," Coach Hirsh said. "I'm really proud of the way our guys fought all game and adjusted in the second half to go on a great run. The resolve they showed in closing the gap on a 10 point deficit in the fourth was extremely fun to watch, and I'm hopeful that it gives our team some confidence and belief in each other. There were a lot of lunch-pail-type plays that may not jump off the page, but had a huge impact

on the outcome of the game."

As an analyst of local sports, nothing is better than getting it right. We told you last week that a winless **SOMERS** team was better than its record indicated (previously 0-6); noting that time and patience were virtues. At the time, Somers was a train wreck, and folks were dunking on the coaching staff. Lo' and behold, Coach Chris DiCintio's Tuskers (5-6) have gone on a five-game tear and are one win shy of .500 as they ready for a road trip to **BREWSTER** today.

Somers has clipped the wings on Yonkers (84-46), John Jay CR (51-49), Greeley (58–40), Tuckahoe (62-45) and Yorktown (57-51) since we implored patience. Outside of the loss to Pelham, the Tuskers have been in every game.

In the win over Yonkers, Tusker swingman Matt Fitzsimons put up 16 points and snagge four boards to pace Somers. Bennet Leitner (14 points, 3 assists, 2 boards) and Christian McGrane (13, points 2 assists, 5 rebounds) were key contributors.

More impressive, though, was the win over John Jay, in which Fitzsimons forced overtime with a clutch buzzer beater to tie the score at 44. Fitzsimons (13 points) followed with a key block to seal the deal. Leitner led the Tuskers with 16 points.

PANAS had a tough time stopping Pioneer G Jaysean Morgan (20 points) in Poughkeepsie's 56-35 win over the host Panthers (6-3). Panas G Alex Tavarez had a team-high 17 points and Oliver Smith added nine for a Panther club that looked like it was still shaking off the rust of several quarantines.

"We were dreadful in the second half," Panas Coach Mike Auerbach admitted. "We have a lot of work to do and not a lot of time to do it if we want to be able to play with Poughkeepsie, Lourdes, Lakeland and the top of class A. We were down our 7-9th guys due to covid protocols, but no excuses. We had our top six. Poughkeepsie was able

More impressive was the OT triumph of John Jay, a Wolves club that had won eight of 10 going in.

MAHOPAC notched a tough road win at YORKTOWN, 60-59, when Colum Ranaghan and Patrick McMahon paced four doubledigit scorers with 13 points apiece. Mike Callahan and Max Gomes each added 11, and Ryan Reilly was credited with superb defense.

Yorktown's Billy Feeks had 22 points to lead all scorers. Justin Price had 18 points and dished seven assists for the Huskers while Eddie Brucaj had nine points and 15 rebounds.

In Mahopac's 60-59 win over Greeley, junior G Joey Koch had a career-high 18 points for the Indians. Gomes added 16. Anthony DeMatteo's key block in the waning seconds preserved the victory. Connor Melis led the Quakers scoring 18 points while teammate Justin Potack added

In the first round of the North Salem tournament Carmel saw DiLeo post a monster double-double with 25 points and




Mahopac senior G Michael Callahan takes a run at Greeley G Justin Potack in Indians' win over Quakers Friday.

Freshman James Apostolico added 10 points after notching a career-high 11 against Haldane. Seniors Cole Durocher, Tommy Calicchio and Holtzman all finished with eight points.

The Tigers showed no quit in a tough 68-60 loss to undefeated Bronxville Saturday,

Versatile Butcher and the Vikings Run Past Pleasantville

When the Valhalla boys' basketball team began its 2021-22 season, head coach Richard Clinchy had a pretty good notion he could count on Basiaka Butcher to provide the Vikings with a strong defensive presence.

Now Clinchy has begun to realize the kind of impact his junior forward can also make at the other end of the court.

"Well, he's like a one-man team," Clinchy was saying on Friday evening soon after watching Butcher erupt for 32 points in the Vikings' 74-53 league victory over visiting Pleasantville. "His shooting this year is so much better than last year. He's an all-around threat now."

Butcher scored Valhalla's first four baskets of the game on his way to 19 first-half points and supplied a pair of buckets early in the third quarter when the Vikings were starting the second half on a 10-2 spurt that stretched a 14-point halftime lead to 52-30. His three straight baskets in the first 80 seconds of the fourth quarter gave Valhalla its largest lead of the night, 65-41.

"I didn't know how good he'd be," conceded Clinchy. "I only saw him a little bit over the summer, so I wasn't quite sure. He reminds me, in some ways, of Ethan Bartlett, who's now a senior at Johns Hopkins. Like Ethan kind of had to do everything for us."

Facing a Panther team that was playing its fourth game in as many days, Valhalla delighted the home crowd by getting on the scoreboard first when Butcher tossed in a floater from left of the lane 19 seconds after tipoff. Despite three more buckets from Butcher in the opening four minutes, all of them layups, the lead changed hands four times.

A fast-break layup by Caleb Bronkema, who led the Panthers with 16 points, tied the game at 9-all with 3:25 remaining in the first quarter. But a basket by junior guard Devan Cooper then gave the Vikings a lead they never relinquished and started an 8-0 run. Still, a left-corner 3-pointer from Dermot McSpedon, followed a minute later by a Dom Matica layup, had Pleasantville within 19-17 before Butcher beat the buzzer ending the period with a left-elbow 3.

The Panthers, now 5-6 this season after their hectic week, cut a nine-point deficit to 28-22 as McSpedon drained a 3-point shot from the right corner two and a half minutes into the second quarter. Valhalla's Julian Amoroso then made both ends of a 1-and-1 opportunity, starting an 11-3 run that included five points from Butcher — a 3-pointer from the left elbow after letting a Panther defender run by and a put-back of his own miss.

The final points of the first half also came from Butcher, on a 3-point shot with just over a minute remaining. The teams left the court with up-tempo Valhalla in front 42-28.

"You can't see all that on film," said Panthers head coach Bob Jordon about the unexpected offensive fireworks from

Butcher. "Obviously you have to see him. But we knew he was gonna be good."

It didn't help Jordon and the Panthers that starting guard Daniel Picart was called for two early fouls and spent a good portion of the first half relegated to the bench.

"Very frustrating," said Jordon. "That second call was tough for him. But you can't leave games in the hands of the officials, either."

A basket by Picart, who scored all 11 of his points in the second half, moved P'ville within 44-30 just 45 seconds into the third quarter. But that was as close at the Panthers could manage to get. Butcher scored on a flip with his left hand to start an 8-0 surge that included a trey from Cooper. Even though the Vikings only scored two points over the final 4:20 of the period, they still held a 57-41 cushion with eight minutes to go.

The fourth quarter began with a short jumper from Viking senior center Darren DiRenzo, who finished with seven points and eight rebounds. Butcher then scored the game's next three baskets, stretching the Valhalla lead to 24 points and assuring the Vikings of their seventh win in eight games

this season.

How good this Viking team can be is a question Clinchy can't answer yet. For now, he's satisfied with their progress this week after a 23-day pause during which they didn't even practice.

"I have no idea," he said with a laugh when asked what the ceiling is for his players. "We played three games this week, so that certainly helps you, just the rhythm of it. We weren't real good the first game. We were better the second game. Tonight was probably our best game of the week."

Meanwhile, Jordon and his Panthers could finally look forward to a few days of rest after a grueling week that would've tested the endurance and fortitude of any team.

"Even though it was a 20-point loss today, we felt we did some nice things," he said. "You know, there's obviously things to correct, but we'll work on it and get it done. We're really excited because they see, take the scoreboard off the wall, that we're playing well together and they're having fun. So we're excited moving forward."

Fourth-Quarter Lead Fades as the Bobcats Lose to Irvington

A hot start and cold finish added up to a disappointing outcome for the Byram Hills girls' basketball team on Saturday evening.

Facing host Irvington in the finale of the day-long Autism Classic, the Bobcats built a 10-point first-half lead, but a 19-4 Bulldog run in the fourth quarter completely turned the game around and left Byram Hills with a 61-55 loss. Despite a game-high 22 points from star guard Beth Corelli, the Bobcats fell to 5-4 this season.

For the Bobcats, who were on a four-game winning streak before a three-week stretch of inactivity derailed their momentum, the dispiriting loss to Irvington was their second of the week. On Monday, they had lost by a point at Rye in overtime on a last-second put-back shot by a player who had never scored a varsity basket before.

Corelli, recently named the Con Edison Athlete of the Week, got Byram Hills off to a strong start against the Bulldogs, now 7-2. She scored 10 first-quarter points, including the first basket of the contest, a long 3-pointer from left of the key, after the teams had battled scoreless for nearly the first three minutes.

A 3-point shot from Bobcat junior guard Amy Gagliardi with just over two minutes left in the first quarter broke a 7-7 tie and Corelli followed with a 17-foot jumper off the dribble nearly a minute later. A pullup trey by Corelli with five seconds to go off of a midcourt inbounds play gave Byram Hills a 15-7 advantage after one quarter.

The Bobcat lead grew to 10 points just 11 seconds into the second quarter when Corelli, using a screen from teammate Olivia Barry, banked in a 15-foot shot. Byram maintained its double-digit margin as Kelsey Vaquero scored on a fast-break layup, assisted by Corelli, with 6:38 remaining before halftime.

But Irvington, sparked by Alyson Raimondo and Claire Friedlander, responded with a 12-2 run that tied the game at 21-apiece with 12 seconds left in the half. Regrettably for the Bobcats, Barry, their senior center who had been repeatedly hitting the deck fighting for the ball, took a hard tumble with 3:17 remaining and never returned

Byram Hills did manage to regain the lead before the break when Carmen Parrotta spun into the lane for a hook shot while getting fouled. She added the free throw for a conventional 3-point play. Parrotta's putback basket 12 seconds into the second half increased the Bobcat edge to 26-21 before a 10-2 Bulldog blitz over the next three

minutes changed the momentum again.

A couple of Corelli baskets on drives restored the Byram lead and 3-pointers from Vaquero and Gagliardi 30 seconds apart opened up a 39-34 margin. But the quarter ended with Bulldog center Katie LeBuhn, who finished with 15 points and 10 rebounds, beating the buzzer with a reverse layup on a put-back shot.

The fourth quarter began with a splash for the Bobcats as Kiley Blackmar and Grace Corelli each hit 3-pointers in the first 45 seconds, stretching the Byram lead to 45-36. But Irvington soon went on its decisive 19-4 run. LeBuhn began the burst with a basket down low and she ended it with two free throws that gave the Bulldogs a six-point lead with 40 seconds to go.

Beth Corelli made a steal under the basket and dropped in a lefty layup with 27 seconds left and Grace Corelli weaved through traffic to spin in another shot off glass with 16 seconds on the clock, but it wasn't enough. Irvington's Amanda Raimondo made four straight foul shots in the final seconds to open up a 61-53 lead and seal the Bobcats' fate.
