Put Valley vs. Mahopac was Epic; Yorktown Heating Up

Putnam Valley vs. Mahopac was one of the finest regular season girls' hoops games in Putnam County history last Thursday when the host Indians prevailed, 73-70, in a heavyweight slugfest.

MAHOPAC swept three games last week - John Jay-Cross River, Rye and Putnam Valley - improving to 10-4 this

"All three were really good wins for us," said senior and captain Melanie DeMeo. "The wins against John Jay and Rye really helped us improve and fix the little things so when it was time to play Putnam Valley, we just had to translate our practices into the game.

'We knew PV was going to be a difficult team to beat," DeMeo added. "We battled them all game. When we play good defense, make our shots and play with energy, we are a really good team. Now we are just looking forward to finishing the regular season strong and heading into the playoffs ready to go.'

Mahopac had four players in double figures against Putnam Valley in a 73-70 win. Kristina Rush led the way with 19 points, DeMeo added 18 points, Julie DeBrocky scored 14 points and Lauren Beberman added 12 points.

This offset a game-high 37 points by Putnam Valley's Eva DeChent, who added an astounding 24 rebounds to go with five steals and five assists; one of the most impressive stat lines in recent memory.

'She is outstanding," Mahopac Coach Chuck Scozzafava said of DeChent. "She's smooth, doesn't panic, plays great defense... total package. Our help D wasn't very helpful on her. PV is quick and athletic. They went small and we had to do the same to counter it. We had a good shooting night, which saved us.'

DeBrocky and Rush each had 17 points as Mahopac went into halftime with a 12-point lead on Rye in a 61-42 win.

Mahopac opened the week with a lastsecond win over John Jay as Beberman provided the margin of victory on a hoop with 2.5 seconds remaining in the game. DeMeo led Mahopac with 19 points and Rush added 13 points.

PUTNAM VALLEY went 1-1 on the week. PV beat North Salem last night 65-39 on senior night. Dechent had 19, Amanda Orlando had 13, Nai Torres had 11, Natalie Mazza had 10. The loss to Mahopac, while heartbreaking, seemed to bring the Tigers together. If nothing else, it proved that when the Tigers (8-6) put their best foot forward, they will be tough for anyone in Class B to contend with. Brianna Foody hit several clutch shots and played one of her best games of the year for PV.

YORKTOWN was anxiously awaiting the 2021-22 varsity girls' basketball regular season to begin in December. However, once it started, the Cornhuskers were placed on delay.

Covid issues for opponents, the first few weeks of the season, resulted in games being rescheduled. As a result, Yorktown

The Cornhuskers have opened the new year with five wins in their last six games, including some thrilling last-second triumphs last week. Yorktown opened the week with a 39-36 win over John Jay-Cross River behind 16 points from Severnino and 10 points and 10 rebounds from Erisa

The Cornhuskers followed with a 38-34 overtime victory over Fox Lane as Kaitlyn Judge swished a 3-pointer with 20 seconds on the clock, giving Yorktown a two-point lead. Severino made two free throws with 3.6 seconds remaining to seal the win.

Yorktown closed the week, rallying from a 10-point deficit in the fourth against Port Chester. Olivia Lucas completed the furious charge with a 3-pointer from the right corner, with 6.5 seconds remaining in the game, for a 59-56 win. Lucas also swished a trey in the final minute against Brewster earlier in January.

Severino scored 12 of her team-best 26 points in the fourth quarter against Port Chester as the Cornhuskers are now 8-5 this season.

"We have stuck together as a team," Severino said. "We help each other through the hard times, and we all have each other's backs. We are starting to gain chemistry on the court and learn what works and what doesn't. We have locked down on defense and left everything on the court.

"Our team has also stepped up in end of

game situations to pull off wins. These are the things that are ultimately going to be the deciding factors in our success during continued on page 7

NWE/Putnam Boys' Hoops Notebook Mahopac, Somers Set to Rock for League Bragging Rights

As my son, Tyler, likes to say about his newly-minted man cave: "It'll be buzzing, dad!"

The same will be true of SOMERS High today when the surging Tuskers - winners of eight-straight - take on visiting MAHOPAC – winners of seven of the last eight – for the top spot in League II-C.

Somers' eighth-straight win came on the heels of six consecutive setbacks to start the season, and last Tuesday's 71-43 win over Rye was just another step in the process as the Tuskers (8-6, 5-1) seek to attain their first league title since 1989. A loss to Mahopac today would all but ensure the Tuskers add another year to one of the longest droughts in Section 1 hoops history, so saddle up for a doozy.

Against Rye (7-8), the Tuskers went off behind the exploits of senior G Bennett Leitner (22 points), junior F Matt Fitzsimons

(16 points, 8 boards) and sophomore wing Andrew Violante (8 points). Win or lose against Mahopac, Somers Coach Chris DiCintio has put his Tuskers (8-6) in a prime position to challenge after nobody in their right mind thought they could so as late as Jan.6 when Mahopac edged the Tuskers. We suspect Round 2 will go down to the wire with Tusker Nation and the Mahopac Maniacs pulling out all the stops in support.

At the same time, Mahopac (9-4, 5-0) was bolstering its approval ratings by taking down BREWSTER, 61-46, behind a balanced attack led by Colum Ranaghan (12 points), Max Gomes (11), Jake Couzens (9), Joey Koch (9) and Ryan Reilly (8). The thing about Mahopac is; it's never one guy. It's hard to say the same thing about Somers, which runs through Leitner and Fitz. Expect Mahopac Coach Tom McMahon to be mindful of that as the Indians attempt to take a two-game lead on the rest of the league.

claim third place Palisades Prep tourney where their string of seven-straight wins came to an end. Without the services of senior sniper Patrick McMahon, Mahopac fell behind early against Clarkstown North before falling, 59-53 in OT. Gomes (14 points) and Michael Callahan (13) led the

YORKTOWN, which has missed having star G Antoine Coles in the lineup the last few games, got off the schneid by beating a solid Briarcliff club, 53-36. The Huskers had lost six of seven going in, but sophomore G Justin Price had a career day, including 10 points, six rebounds, six assists and five steals. Senior G Marco Jovicevic added 12 points, four rebounds and five steals while G Billy Feeks and C Eddie Brucaj added 10 points each for the Huskers (7-9), who carried that momentum into a dominant 57-42 win against visiting CARMEL Thursday. The two solid wins have Coach Mark Pavella's Huskers believing they can get this fixed before the postseason unfolds.

The Huskers needed a quality W and knocking off Carmel, behind a career-high 25 from Feeks, provided just that. Price (8 points, 7 rebounds, 4 assists) continued his progression while Brucaj (8 points, 8 rebounds) was solid in the paint, giving Yorktown reason to believe.


Kevin Dall (9 points), Andrew Fiore (9 points), Nick DiLeo (6 points, 11 boards), Randy Aboagye (3 points, 9 rebounds) and Danny Monahan (14 points) paced the Rams.

LAKELAND is getting healthy again and the Hornets (7-5) snapped a three-game slide with a solid 72-58 win over visiting John Jay CR. Andrew Mendel scored six of his 10 points in the fourth to hold off a 16-13 John Jay run. Hornet junior F Logan Shiland owned the first half, dropping 18 of his 20 points, including four 3's.

CARMEL (8-4) is having an about-face/ forward-march-type season, one that has gained traction after the Rams got their basketball legs back after winning the NYS Class AA grid title in early Dec.

In Carmel's 81-67 win over Ramapo, the Rams (8-4) got contributions across the board, none bigger than the double-double from DiLeo (19 points, 11 boards). Fiore (23 points, 5 boards), Dall (19 points, 7 boards) and Aboagye (11 points, 16 rebounds) provided four additional prime-time contributors, who are looking to change the way people look at Carmel hoopers.

"Our goal remains the same as it did for football, we want to win the section championship,"

Fiore admitted. "Carmel has always been looked down on. We've had a number

of losing seasons, but this team is trying to change that. We're trying to change the Carmel basketball culture."

In a 63-54 win over John Jay EF, Dall (8 points), Fiore (19 points, 5 rebounds), DiLeo (19 points, 8 rebounds), Aboagye (8 points, 13caroms) and Monahan (9 points) each delivered in a big way.

OSSINING is emerging as a potential quarterfinal club after a 50-33 road win at Ramapo and a 65-30 blowout of rival Sleepy Hollow. Senior G Jaeden Carr (14 points, 4 steals, 3 assists) triggered the win over Ramapo. Talented Pride sophomores Isaiah Ahlers (11 points, 4 rebounds) and Jaiden Newton (11 points, 7 rebounds, 3 steals) were on the rise.

Against Sleepy Hollow, Carr paced the Pride with 19 points, six boards and three steals. Vinny Bernardo (18 points, 4 rebounds), Dominique Bautista (8 points, 4 boards) and Isaiah Haye (6 points) were prominent.

No.1 MAHOPAC – Coach McMahon's Class A Indians (8-4) will find it tough but not impossible – as the current No.9 seed – to feast at home in the playoffs, which is always vital in these 8/9-type games. Need to finish strong to play in front of the #Maniacs.

No.2 PANAS – Coach Auerbach's Class A Panthers (9-4) have moved up to the No.8 seed after three-straight wins, one of which – a 62-53 win over White Plains – was pretty impressive. No.4 SOMERS — Since Jan.6, Coach DiCintio's Class A Tuskers (8-6) have moved from the No.31 seed to No.13, and in doing so there's nothing left to complain about in Tusker Nation. Would love to see them snap this league title drought but the deck is stacked against them with 4 league games left and no wiggle room for losses.

No.5 OSSINING — Coach Casey's Class AA Pride (9-5), the current No.8 seed, have reeled of four-straight wins, two of which were impressive home wins against Mamaroneck and Fox Lane. Of their six remaining games, the Pride have two tough games against a desperate White Plains outfit, which is better than its 5-9 record would indicate, and another with Arlington.

No.5A YORKTOWN — Coach Pavella's Class A Huskers (7-8), the current No.19 seed, have five league games left (all winnable, we might add), which could turn that 0-5 league frown upside down with a .500 finish. We'll settle for nothing less than 4-6, though.

HM CARMEL – Coach Johansen's surging Class AA Rams (8-4) blindsided most of us with that 15-point drubbing at the hands of Yorktown, thus snapping their four game win streak and falling to No.9 seed as a result. The docket is loaded with major upcoming challenges against RCK (2X), Fox Lane, Clarkstown South and Arlington, who combine to go 33-14 (vs. Section 1 foes). Let's see what we're made of, boys.

HM LAKELAND — Coach Fallo's Class A Hornets (7-5) snapped a 3-game skid with an impressive win over John Jay to inch up to the No.12 seed. Remember, Lakeland had a shaky start in 2021, only to win the West,/Putnam small school regional #JustSayin.

HM HEH HUD – Coach Hirsch's Class A Sailors (7-6) cling to the No.17 seed but have one of the toughest schedules left in the land, including Lourdes (2X), Panas, Lakeland and Poughkeepsie.

HM PUTNAM VALLEY — Ever since that 8-point loss to a solid Bronxville club (9-3) on Jan. 15, Coach Morales' Tigers (6-8) have figured the game out, doing so with almost-stunning wins over North Salem (9-4) and Valhalla (8-3). Suddenly, the Tigers, the current No.13 seed, can compete and challenge with anyone in Class B #YaGottaBelieve! Sidenote: Section 1 is without representation in the NYSSWA Class B poll.

Foxes Overwhelm Greeley in Front of a Boisterous Crowd

In a couple of weeks, the Horace Greeley boys' basketball team just might be entering the sectional playoffs as the scariest, most dangerous sub-.500 opponent any high seed would ever want to face.

But on Thursday night, with the one player, Nick Townsend, who could instantly transform the Quakers' fortunes still relegated to their bench as an assistant coach/cheerleader, they had to endure at least one more outing as the proverbial 98-pounder who gets sand kicked in his face at the beach.

In front of a boisterous crowd that nearly filled the gym, host Fox Lane never trailed all evening and used an 11-0 second-quarter run to pull away from the Quakers in a 61-33 victory. Senior guard Justin Allen scored a game-high 19 points and grabbed eight rebounds as the Foxes earned local bragging rights while improving to 9-5 this season.

"This is a tough team," said Quaker head coach Matt Simone about Fox Lane. "Watching them on film and playing them today, I was very impressed with how Fox Lane plays. I think in AA, they're one of the top teams. They've got inside, outside, senior leadership, guys that can shoot. So we knew regardless of who we had on the floor, this was gonna be a tough team and a tough game."

Greeley, which fell to 5-10 with the loss, was forced to play without three starters, including point guard Connor Melis. To make matters worse, Justin Potack, who had erupted for 37 points in the Quakers' win at Brewster a day earlier, was forced to the bench by an injury with just under three minutes remaining in the third quarter.

By then, though, the outcome was hardly in doubt. Potack picked up right where he left off against Brewster by nailing a long 3-pointer from the top of the key for Greeley's first basket of the game, but then he never scored again as the Fox defense

harassed him into rushed and contested shots

"We've got some of the best defenders in Section One with Justin Allen and Charlie Shevick," said Fox Lane coach Mike Tomassi. "They definitely saw the 37 last night and we pride ourselves on our defense, and that was definitely something we wanted to take away tonight. Charlie took the assignment and he's been a three-year varsity player and one of our best defenders during his tenure here."

Without the steady hand of Melis on the floor, the Quakers turned the ball over half a dozen times in the opening quarter and found themselves trailing 14-3 after a 9-0 spurt by Fox Lane that began with a 3-pointer from the left corner by Michael Lombardi. Allen soon followed with a steal that led to his

coast-to-coast layup after he weaved past a pair of

Lombardi, who scored seven of his 10 points in the first quarter, then added a fast-break lefty layup off a lead pass from Allen. Junior forward Nikolas Dent capped the spurt by hitting on a short off-balance runner in the paint with 2:46 to go in the quarter.

Greeley finally gave its black-clad student section something to cheer about when Josh Nadel, who paced the team with 13 points, nailed a 3-pointer and

then Brandon Fitzsimmons spun into the lane for a scoop shot off glass. But the quarter ended with Fox Lane ahead 18-8 after Dent drove to the right baseline for a bucket and then Lombardi scored on a fast-break layup just before the buzzer.

After the Quakers cut their deficit down to just six points early in the second quarter, Fox Lane proceeded to score the game's next 11 points to take complete command. 

Allen's steal that led to his breakaway onehanded dunk.

Despite a Slow Start, Westlake Earns a Win Over the Tigers

Playing its first game in nine days, the Westlake girls' basketball team had to shake off a bit of rust on Friday afternoon.

The Wildcats struggled mightily to put points on the board in the first half against visiting Croton-Harmon and even went more than six minutes before finally scoring in the second quarter. But they emerged from the locker room after halftime and quickly took command, outscoring the Tigers 16-4 in the third quarter on the way to a 44-31 victory.

"We were off all week and it took us a little time to get our groove back," said Wildcats head coach Sean Mayer shortly after his team had earned its fourth straight win. "We didn't make some shots, we were a

little sluggish, a lot of turnovers. At halftime, we made some adjustments."

Allie Castellone scored nine of her gamehigh 20 points in Westlake's big third quarter, helping the Wildcats improve to 10-3 this season. Her 3-point basket from the top of the key just 10 seconds into the third quarter broke a 14-14 halftime tie and gave the Wildcats a lead they never relinquished.

After a pair of free throws by Lucia Thoreson moved Croton within a point nearly a minute into the second half, the Wildcats outscored the Tigers 13-2 over the rest of the third quarter. Back-to-back layups from Riley Giaccone started the big run and then a couple of baskets from Castellone, exactly a minute apart, enabled Westlake to grab its first double-digit lead of the day.

With 35 seconds remaining in the period,

Castellone weaved her way through the lane for a scoop shot that gave the Wildcats, who once trailed 9-2 and 11-4, a 30-18 advantage heading into the fourth quarter. Westake built its largest lead, 14 points, when ToniAnn Mastracchio, who scored all nine of her points in the last quarter, connected on a 17-foot jumper from the right baseline 30 seconds in.

"We wanted to get the ball inside, in the paint, a little bit more, and we did that," said Mayer about the halftime adjustments. "Obviously when your half-court offense is sluggish, getting fast-break points is huge. And that opened things up. We had a big third quarter and that kind of set the stage."

Despite 10 fourth-quarter points from Thoreson, who finished with 20, Croton never got any closer than eight points down the stretch. A 15-foot jumper from just left of the foul line by Mastracchio with 1:13 remaining on the clock all but sealed the outcome, and Castellone provided the Wildcats with their final margin when she hit on a 3-pointer out of the right corner with 45 seconds to go.

"It was a nice win," said Mayer, who would've liked to have played a game or two during the nineday layoff. "We've had some good practices, but, you know, when you don't play for that long it does take time to get to your groove. We made some very basic mistakes early."

As a result, Croton, now 4-11, jumped out to a surprising early lead. The Wildcats just couldn't put the ball in the basket and it took a baseline jumper by Julie Lyden and then a put-back from Francesca DeMartino to get them within 11-8 at the end of the first quarter.

In the first minute of the second quarter, the Tigers stretched their lead back up to six points, but then never scored again the rest of the first half. Westlake, meanwhile, wasn't much better offensively. But after going scoreless themselves over the first six minutes of the period, the Wildcats ended the half with a pair of 3-pointers from Castellone that sent

the teams off at halftime even at 14-apiece.

The first-half struggle for the Wildcats was a disappointing follow-up to their dazzling 56-28 home rout of Briarcliff in their previous game. Castellone and Lyden led the way with 14 points apiece and Giaccone and Sami Oswald combined for 20 more as Westlake played one of its most memorable games in Mayer's long tenure at the school.

"That was probably one of our best games as a program, and I've been here 21 years," he said. "Really, from start to finish, we took it to 'em. We made a lot of shots. Briarcliff wasn't on and we were."

A game like that can cause a team to dream of even bigger things down the road.

"You know, we've talked about it," said Mayer. "We certainly have our goals. But
