

Yorktown Stumbles in 4th, Falls to Rye, 9-7; Somers Surging

YORKTOWN senior All-American A Harry Griff bagged a combined eight goals and dished five assists in the Huskers' 14-4 win over Wappingers and their 14-10 win over Scarsdale, but reigning champion Rye countered wisely in Saturday's 9-7 win over the Huskers in a super-hyped rematch of last year's Class B title tilt, limiting Griff to a pair of assists.

Things began rather swimmingly for stateranked (No.5) Yorktown against No.3 Rye when Griff found James Solazzo for a 1-0 lead at 9:10 of the first. Solazzo then scored manup at 9:57 before finding Sava Makarenko for a 3-0 lead at 7:40 of the second. Things went downhill from there with the Garnets scoring four unanswered before the half to take a 4-3 lead.

Rye's Tommy Greenhaw went back-toback at 2:53 of the second to make it 3-2, Huskers. Owen Kovacs tied the score at 3-3 before long pole Carter Barford scored with :10 left in the half.

A #YardSale takeaway by Yorktown led to a 4-4 tie when Drew Weissman spun and won, unassisted at 5:34 of the third. The Huskers then took the lead when Solazzo, playing a career game, scored in the waning seconds of the third. Rye responded in kind at 11:25 of the fourth when Kovacs tickled twine and then Tanner Howson found the back of the net for a 6-5 Garnet lead they would not relinquish at 8:51.

Howson then came out from behind the X and spotted Rye a two-goal lead just seconds later, and more mystery ensued for Yorktown when Whaling picked a corner at 7:35 for a three-goal lead. Rye put the final nail in the coffin when Whaling beat a reddog double-team and zipped it into an empty net with 2:40 to play. Solazzo tacked on a pair of late tallies to make it close. If nothing else, 40-time Section 1 champion Yorktown, which hasn't won it all since 2017, proved it could hang with the Garnets.

In Yorktown's win over Scarsdale, Ryan Vogel adde two goals and two assists while Jack Duncan and Makarenko netted two goals apiece.


Against Wappingers, Duncan added four goals and an assist for the Huskers and Solazzo finished with two goals and three assists in what was a breakout week for the senior...

Despite fielding a veritable M.A.S.H. Unit Coach Jim Lindsay's **LAKELAND/PANAS** Rebels (2-5) were right there with visiting John Jay CR last Thursday when junior M Justin Stabile had a career quarter, scoring back-to-back-to-back goals to bring the Rebels within 6-4 midway through the third. However, the well ran dry on L/P, which was without its three top poles, in what would become a 13-5 beatdown at the hands of the Wolves (5-2).

Wolves Chris DiChiara (3G, 1A), Luca Duva (3G) and Nick Savastano (2G, 2A) feasted upon the undermanned L/P defense, courtesy of M Dom Savastano (15 faceoff wins, 8 GBs) owning the draw box.

With six players sidelined, the Rebels can only hope to heal up in a hurry and get ready for May. Joe Alleva and Nick Graap each scored once for the Rebels, who need more from Graap after he netted a hat trick in a 15-9 loss to state-ranked (No.3) Class A Mamaroneck earlier in the week, if they are

Hen Hud to Celebrate Lent on May 7; Sailors Deck Yorktown

If you're in the neighborhood on Saturday, May 7th, and you have had anything to do with Hendrick Hudson High baseball, stop by Sunset Field just before 11 a.m. for a brief ceremony memorializing the impact of longtime Sailor assistant coach Ed Lent. Mr. Lent was a friend of mine, a guy I could count on for wisdom, for friendship and family-based ideology. Seeing him, no matter where we were, warmed my heart, and his departure into devine immortality last fall struck a chord with anyone who ever donned a Sailor baseball uniform and those that knew him for what he was; a true family man and friend to all.

Coaches, especially in the 80's and 90's – when Mr. Lent first joined the Sailor staff (mid '80s) – could be tougher on kids than they are nowadays, but tough love is something Mr. Lent specialized in. While former head coaches Paul Natalie and Dutch Pritts, and current coach Van Vourliotis, were serving as the front men for the Sailors, Lent, an unpaid volunteer within the program, was behind the scenes, serving as the bridge between players and head coaches. Players leaned on him, trusted him and went to him for everything from pitching tips – which he specialized in – to everyday advice.

"He did that for three decades and never got a dime," Natlaie said. "Ed was as loyal as they come. Everybody loved him. You never heard anyone say a bad word about him."

Hen Hud Athletic Director Tommy Baker and Coach Vourliotis are banging the drums to get as many alumni and friends of Mr. Lent as possible Sunset Field, which essentially served as his back yard, to celebrate his 34 years of volunteering to the Sailor community.

"He deserves that and more," Vourliotis said. "His family will be giving out a scholarship to a senior in his memory going forward."

One of those seniors in line for such an offer might be P Josh Shea, who went 6-2/3rds innings in the Sailors 10-4 win over visiting **YORKTOWN** Friday. Captain Shea, the ace of an otherwise young pitching staff, whiffed 10 Huskers (4-3), walked no one and scattered seven hits before reaching his pitch limit.

Little does anyone know, baseball is Shea's second sport. Funny thing, which not a lot of people know, Shea is the best national racquetball player at his age in the entire country - a legit No.1 for the last year, who won nationals a month ago.

"Josh is the man," Coach V said. "He's a great leader for this team, he's like a third coach on the field. He threw 210 pitches in five days this week and carried us on his back. He is the most mentally tough player I've ever coached and he just loves to be coached."

After a poor showing against Nanuet earlier in the week, the Sailors, on their own, stayed after practice and hit in the cage for 45 minutes before asking for extra fielding work.

"Never been a part of a team like that

here." Coach V said.

Leading 6-4 in the sixth, the Sailors (5-3) put the Yorktown game away with back-to-back doubles by junior LF Mike Tucci and a two-run, two-bagger by sophomore 1B Max Lipton for a 9-4 lead. Sailor junior C Alec Tangredi delivered a two-run, pinch-hit double for a 6-3 Hen Hud lead in the third. Cole Haddock tripled and scored a run for Yorktown, which also saw red hot Dyaln Koch (2B) drive home a pair of runs.

Shea was also superb in a 1-0 win over **MAHOPAC** earlier in the week, allowing just three hits while whiffing nine Indians (1-7). He did not walk a batter. Tucci's fifthinning sac fly was the difference between the two sides. Mahopac also lost 8-3 to North Salem and 11-3 to Yorktown. The Huskers put up crooked numbers in four frames against the Indians, doing so behind a pair of RBI apiece from Haddock, Jon Munoz (4-4, 3B) and Stephen Haglund.

Yorktown also defeated Valhalla, 13-6, Saturday. Koch (3-4, 3 RBI) crushed it. Jason Peragallo went 3-for-5 and Haddock was 3-for-4 with a dinger and fanned all nine batters he faced over three scoreless frames. Munoz (2 hits, 2 RBI, 1R) and Haglund (2 RBI) were menacing figures.

BREWSTER is off to a solid 3-2 start after beating Lourdes, 6-1, behind a solid pitching effort from sophomore George Vallecillo (6 IP, 10K, 3H, 0 ER). Junior OF Collin Brennen (2 RBI), senior SS Shane McLaughlin (2 RBI) and junior C Antonio Galizia (RBI 3B) all supported his cause. The Bears began the week with a 9-6 loss to previously undefeated PANAS (6-1), which took a 4-0 loss on the chin at John Jay CR Saturday. The Panthers needed to shake that off in preparation for last night's bout with Class AA heavyweight Arlington.

Against the Bears, Panas P Aidan Cohall went five screoless frames with eight whiffs to earn the win. Jackson Dilorenzo homered and knocked in four runs while Gavin Carlucci (3-for-3) and Derek Hawley (2 RBI) had solid efforts.


SOMERS (3-4) hung tough with a very solid BYRAM HILLS club, before the Bobcats (7-0-1) turned a two-run lead into a 9-5 win behind P Fred Saltstein (6 IP, 10 K) and a pair of two-run bombs by Danny Bernstein and Jack Blackmar. Somers knocked off LAKELAND (2-7) earlier in the week and hoped to get on a roll with two against winless Greeley and two more against one-win Mahopac upcoming. The big test will come today when the Tuskers see Panas. Lakeland is down by its standards but isn't ducking anyone and has tested itself against three unbeaten foes: Rye (10-0), Byram Hills (7-0-1) and Arlington (7-0).

CLASS AA

CARMEL was struck by the Gallagher Kiss of Death last week. Featured on the front page of last week's Examiner due to their incredible 6-0 start, the reigning Section 1 champion Rams (6-4) were brutalized in a pair of lopsided losses to mighty Suffern, 15-0 and 12-1, plus another pair of one-run setbacks to John Jay EF. Servedio, Class A Finalists Yorktown Picking up Where it Left off

Annually, teams have to face graduation departures which is difficult, especially if it includes their pitchers. However, when a softball or baseball team returns its top pitcher, it makes the ensuing season somewhat easier to prepare for.

YORKTOWN had to replace three impact players as it prepared for the 2022 varsity softball season. But, the 2021 Section 1 Class A finalist, held an ace in its hands. Yorktown has won four of its first five games because of senior P Maya Servedio's excellence in the circle. Servedio, who established herself as one of Section 1's finest last year, has taken it one step higher through the early season.

The Colgate-bound Servedio has recorded double-digit strikeouts in four games and has rang up 68 this season. Her season-high is 18 and she came within one strikeout, against Class AA power R.C. Ketcham, of making it five games in double digits. Servedio also has shutouts of Ursuline and perennial Section 1 Class AA power Arlington.

However, Ketcham handed Yorktown its only loss – 4-1. Servedio slammed a home run. While Servedio has been a prime factor in Yorktown's success, she is quick to cite her teammates' equally sizeable contributions, especially the newcomers.

"We did lose three strong players that played a huge part in our success last year," said Servedio, who plans on majoring in Economics and will continue with softball. "However, we did bring up five extremely talented underclassmen in Eva Destito, Julia Centofanti, Vittoria Milizia, Sophia Reilly and Bella Gomes, who were eager to work hard and learn.

"I do think they have been and will continue to do an incredible job of filling the big shoes our three seniors left last year."

Servedio, in her second season as Yorktown's ace, also traces the team's early success to its defense; a pitcher's best friend.

"I think we're all pleased with the way our season has gone thus far," said Servedio, who was promoted to varsity freshman year for sectionals. "I believe our defense has been incredibly solid and our energy unmatched. We're so excited to get back out on the field and play together, especially after the devastating loss we suffered at the end of last season (Class A finals to Lakeland)."

Servedio, the only pitcher to

beat 2021 Section 1 Class AA champion Mahopac and Shannon Becker last year, had her finest outing against Arlington. She allowed one hit and struck out 10. Olivia Salveggi's home run in the fourth inning was all Servedio needed.

"During the Arlington game I think most of my success was due to the lock-down defense my team played, as well as the phenomenal pitch-calling from our freshman catcher, Eva Destito. She showed real maturity behind the plate and kept the hitters off balance while calling pitchers that were having success that game."

Even though Yorktown was not pleased with the loss to Ketcham, the Cornhuskers (4-1) went to work on what adjustments needed to be made off this game.

"Over spring break we focused on adjusting as hitters pitch-to-pitch as well as positioning, which we felt could be improved upon after the Ketcham game," Servedio said. "Personally, I believe I need to work on utilizing my repertoire of pitches, as well as getting ahead in the count."

Yorktown returns from break to host John Jay-Cross River (today), Brewster (Thursday) and the Yorktown Tournament title game (Friday). The Cornhuskers travel to Somers (Saturday).

BREWSTER opened the week with wins over Walter Panas (17-0, in five innings) and Our Lady of Lourdes (9-5), before Hen Hud handed the Bears (4-1) their first loss of the season, 12-2.

Brewster Coach Lisa Delzio said that Kate Katsetos, after a torrid first week, continued her hot hitting. Katsetos had two hits, including a triple, drove in three runs and scored three runs against Panas.

Isabella Rizzieri went 3 for 4 with three RBI and Kylie Dudones slammed a two-run homer to back the two-hit pitching of Natalie Hayes, who also had seven strikeouts.

Katsetos doubled among her two hits and had four RBI against Lourdes. Hayes added a two-run double.

Brewster led Hen Hud, 2-0 after four innings before the Sailors erupted. Brewster (4-1) faces a difficult week playing Mahopac (3-1) and Yorktown consecutively.

SOMERS played one game, but it was a memorable 3-2 win over 2021 Section 1 Class A champion Lakeland. The Tuskers (2-2) were trailing 2-0 after five innings before rallying for three runs, with two outs, in the sixth inning.

Krista Gallagher's single plated

Emily Stavola with the first run. Avery Kossow followed with a fence-clearing home run, giving Somers a 3-2 lead. The defense stepped up in the seventh inning to preserve the win as centerfielder Ellie Walsh threw out the attempted tying run at the plate to conclude the game. Gigi Krantz tossed a seven-hitter in the win.

HEN HUD was held scoreless through the first four innings against Brewster, but the slumbering bats woke up in the fifth. The Sailors (2-3) turned a 2-0 deficit into an eventual, 12-2 win. It was Hen Hud's first game in a week because of the rainy April.

Bella Buscetto led Hen Hud with three hits and three runs scored. Ja'Nae Walker homered among her two hits and had three RBI. Sydney Muranaka also had two hits, scored twice and drove in a run and Taeghan Dapson had one hit and three RBI. Freshman Kiely Morley and eighth-grader Emma Barbelet each had their first varsity hits. Lost in the offensive output was pitcher Alana Espinoza's one-hitter with 12 strikeouts.

Hen Hud trailed Pearl River, 6-0, in the bottom of the third inning before the game was suspended because of thunderstorms. Hen Hud Coach Will Mauro said his team had two runners on base in the first three innings, but was unable to score.

Hen Hud has a busy week as it hosts John Jay-East Fishkill, today, travels to Our Lady of Lourdes, Thursday, then hosts its annual tournament, Saturday. Fox Lane plays Putnam Valley and Hen Hud faces Panas.

A young **PUTNAM VALLEY** is still finding its way after a loss to Pleasantville and Briarcliff. The Pleasantville game was a

Chicoine's Hitting and Pitching Leads the Bobcats Past Hen Hud

It's hard to say whether it was Bobby Chicoine's bat or his throwing arm that made a bigger impression last Tuesday.

The Byram Hills senior standout pitched six scoreless innings, striking out 14 Hendrick Hudson batters and yielding just two hits, and also went 3-for-3 at the plate, including a prodigious second-inning home run into the distant left-field stands at Rockland County's Clover Stadium that highlighted the Bobcats' 8-0 victory over the Sailors.

"He was special today," said Bobcats head coach Scott Saunders shortly after witnessing the multidimensional exploits of Chicoine. "Just a testament to him. He's just such a great kid, he works so hard, and to be able to come out and pitch like that on the mound today, in this spot, was just really special for him.'

On a day when early-morning rain gave way to abundant sunshine, Chicoine wasted no time providing the Sailors with a glimpse of what they were in for as he retired the side in order to start the game and collected his first two strikeouts, both of them looking.

In the bottom of the first inning, Byram leadoff batter Christian Bellantoni doubled to right and scored one out later on a triple by Jared Cohen. Chicoine, hitting cleanup, brought in another run with a single to center.

After Chicoine set the Sailors down 1-2-3 again in the second, with two more strikeouts, the Bobcats all but put the game out of reach in their half of the inning, scoring five runs to open up a 7-0 advantage. The big inning began with walks to Dylan Ettinger and Justin Barad. They both soon scored on Danny Bernstein's single to right field.

Bernstein, along with Cohen, who had reached on a walk, were both in scoring position with Chicoine at the plate. Hen Hud hurler Kieran Plunkett probably wishes he had issued him an intentional walk because Chicoine jumped on one of his offerings and sent a line-drive shot deep to left field that

landed with a loud thud as it caromed off the bleachers beyond the wall.

"Oh yeah, it's definitely something that I'm gonna remember for a long, long time," said Chicoine about his long home run in a ballpark built to test professional players.

"I couldn't be happier for him," said Saunders. "He typically hits the ball real hard and sometimes they go up in the trees and it's tough to tell how far they went. But we had a pretty good idea how far it went today. It just kind of jumped off the bat. You know, he took a great swing on it, found a great pitch to hit and he did some damage

Chicoine never actually saw the ball clear the fence and was running down the line toward first unsure if he was going to have to settle for an extra-base hit instead of a

"I was thinking, because of what I'm used to, that it'll be out," he said. "As I was running down the line, I was like, 'No, maybe not, it's gonna hit the warning track or off the wall.' So I started kind of running a little bit and then once I heard the cheering I knew, and it was surreal."

Chicoine followed up his electrifying home-run blast by striking out the side in























The Setters' Maxwell Streety tries to get to the cage in the first half of last Tuesday's 15-9 home victory over Assumption.






