Surging No.12 Somers Cracks State Polls, Nips Mahopac, 10-7

We have been saying in this space for quite some time now that emergent **SOMERS** is veering toward excellence again; not the excellence we saw between 2000-09 when the Tuskers reeled off six Section 1 titles and produced All-Americans like Jordan Rabidou and Jo Jo Marasco. But ya never know.

Somers senior T.J. Olifers has been on the Class B scene the last four years as Somers has trotted out an "also-ran" unit that was decent but not quite part of the second tier of teams beneath the upper crust of 40-time champion Yorktown, 10-time champion John Jay and seven-time and reigning Class B champion Rye.

Through no fault of anybody's, Somers hit a cyclical period whereby the Tuskers weren't producing as much All-Section talent like they had prior to 2010, which coincides with their last sectional title appearance, a 9-6 loss to John Jay CR.

But if you take a look at the current roster, which just disposed of visiting MAHOPAC, 10-7, last Tuesday, one will see a host of next-level individuals who are buying into Coach Vin DeGregorio's #WeNotMe system, sharing and caring for the ball – and each other – like they have not done in years, according to senior captain TJ Olifers.

'The young talent that everyone sees is part of the program that Coach DeGregorio is building in Somers, which is trusting everyone to do their job, and the "we-not-me" lacrosse culture." the Muhlenberg-bound Olifers said. "Since my freshman year on varsity I have played with many great lacrosse players like Nick Rossi and TJ Deagan. The foundation for the success you're seeing now has been set by players like them, who myself and the kids in the youth program can look up to. This year. the coaches and our team have bought into trusting everyone so that anyone is a threat on the field. The success also doesn't come without the underrated talent of Derek Marcus who we can trust to lock down any player."

display against Mahopac, which failed to slow down sophomore Newman (4G, 1A), who was oftentimes set up by freshman Miguel Iglesias (4A), who also dished to sophomore Mac Sullivan (2G, 1A) and freshman Ryan Brush (2G, 1A). Yeah, just like 'The Who' sang back in 1965... The Kids Are Alright. Nine of Somers' 10 goals were assisted.

Seniors – Olifers (2G), A Henry Ellison (2A), G Hunter Sullivan and game-changing pole Derek Marcus, among others – have set an excellent example, and the kids have bought in, according to DeGregorio, who the players were quick to give credit to.

"I give a lot of credit to Coach Vin, he built up the team we have right now all the way from youth, he held clinics and did a lot for us to love the sport.," Marcus said. "The difference is that not one person on our team is selfish. We have assisted more than 80% of our goals, which is unheard of. I just knew from the start we could have something going by the way we play at practice and the way we act off the field, too. My teammates are a special group of people and are awesome to play with my senior year."

The state-ranked (No. 12) Tuskers (9-1) still have a lot to prove, but the win over an

improved Mahopac club was a step in the right direction.

Mahopac FOGO Chris Evans kept the Indians in the game, which was 7-7 after three quarters, winning 15 of 22 faceoffs while gobbling nine GBs to set up the likes of sophomore Danny Koch (2G, 1A), junior Gavin Viglucci (2G), junior Mike Rettberg (2G) and West Point-bound senior Mike Harney (1G, 3A).

Somers went on to defeat Class D state-ranked (No.3) **PLEASANTVILLE**, 10-3, behind a superb second-half effort from G Hunter Sullivan (13 saves). The Panthers had nothing to slow down Olifiers (4G, 1A). Brush (3G), Newman (1G, 1A), Iglesias (1G, 1A) and Ellison (1G) were quick to pile on.

YORKTOWN has lost four in a row, but don't be fooled into thinking Coach Tim Schurr's state-ranked (No.4) Huskers (4-5) are not prime-time players for the Section 1 Class B crown. The four losses were

against some of the finest programs in the nation, including state-ranked (No.3) Rye (9-7), CT power Darien (9-8), (No.7 Class D) Cold Spring Harbor (6-3) and (No.2 Class A) Chaminade (17-8). So settle down until we see what happens today when the Huskers take on John Jay CR, the Section 1 program that lifted the veil of invincibility back in 2018. We're not going to panic on the Huskers, who traditionally play an extremely tough schedule, until we see what happens later today, though a loss to John Jay would give cause for concern.

CLASS C/D

HEN HUD is feeling pretty, pretty good after the Class C Sailors (3-5) left as bosses against **PUTNAM VALLEY** in a 7-4 win and **BYRAM HILLS** in a 10-9 triumph; all three teams are bidding for Class C supremacy with state-ranked (No.8) Tappan Zee serving






We're at the halfway point of the season and the contenders are beginning to separate themselves from the pretenders.







Undefeated Mahopac off to Best Start in History

MAHOPAC faced two major adjustments as it prepared for the 2022 varsity girls' lacrosse season, The Indians bid adieu to 10 graduated seniors and also welcomed a new coach in Christina D'Amore. Even though D'Amore was a first-year varsity coach, the players were very familiar with her as D'Amore was the Junior Varsity leader last year.

Once preseason commenced and the players acclimated themselves to D'Amore's coaching approach, All-Section senior Ava Jennings had a positive feeling about the team's promising season.

"I was able to see how much talent and skill we had," said Jennings, a senior and four-year varsity starter. "We have a variety of different girls at different positions who bring a lot to the table. Even before the season started, I knew each girl very well and I knew all of them bring different qualities to the team. We also mesh very well together. Our team is like a family on and off the field. The team chemistry before the season started really put us in a good position on the field."

Jennings was on point as Mahopac owns a program-record eight consecutive wins to start the season. The Indians improved to 8-0 after victories over Arlington (18-5) and Wappingers (20-14).

Mahopac could not have asked for a better result to the season's first half. Not only have the returnees raised their level of play, the new varsity players have stepped in and made immediate contributions.

"I'm very impressed by the way we adjusted to the loss of our senior class last year," said Jennings, who will attend the University of Cincinnati in September and also play lacrosse. "Several seniors were key parts to our offense and defense. Our goalies, defense, and offensive players really stepped up to fill the shoes of those graduated seniors."

This was evident in the seasonopener against BYRAM HILLS, one of the top Section 1 teams in 2021. Battling the nasty weather conditions along with a quality Byram Hills' team, Mahopac began the season with an overtime win. Since then, Mahopac has been building on each victory.

"Although we know we still have a handful of tough games left, one huge win for us was Byram Hills, which was our first game of the season," Jennings said. "We really didn't have the time to get all the moving parts flowing smoothly. It was a game played in the pouring rain and hail and it was very competitive. Byram Hills was ready for the fight, especially since their head coach is our former assistant coach, and knows our style of play."

Mahopac registered its seventh win with a strong second half over Wappingers as it outscored the opponent, 8-2.

Nicole Panny established a new program standard of 13 points five goals and eight assists. Audrey Colucci registered a teambest six goals and Jennings added five goals, four draw controls and she scooped up five ground balls. Avery Przymylski led the team with seven draw controls and also added a hat trick.

Colucci finished with four goals and Ally Savino contributed three goals as nine players found the net in the win over Arlington. Erin Harney, Jennings, Panny (four assists) and Przymylski (six draw controls) had two goals apiece. Harney was assisted by sister, Hannah, on one of her goals.

'We have been playing as a team and making magic happen on the field," D'Amore said. "We are so proud of all the girls and their hard work has been paying off!"

Mahopac has a tough week as it hosts reigning Class C champion HEN HUD before going to Putnam rival BREWSTER and John Jay-Cross River.

Jennings said she and her teammates are proud of what they have accomplished, to date, but are aiming to continue playing at a high level. Hopefully, this leads to the team peaking for sectionals.

"It feels good to be part of program history with such an amazing team and coaching staff," Jennings said. "We're all dedicated, and work hard, and we

hope to continue this streak of an undefeated season. We need to continue to do the things that we've been doing well all season, but definitely address some of the things we can improve on in order to progress through sectionals by really focusing on game film, lots of practicing, and continuing to play as a team, and to be strong at all corners of the

BREWSTER improved to 7-3 this season after a 17-7 win over Our Lady of Lourdes and a nail-biting 8-7 triumph of North

Morgan Brace led Brewster with four goals and added two assists and five draw controls against Lourdes, Sasha Kulo chipped in with three goals, three assists and eight draw controls.



For Fox Lane first-year head coach ToniAnn Licata, whose work-in-progress team recently endured a six-game losing streak, the loss to the Sailors was a vivid reminder of some of the problems she's witnessed all season.

"Well, with our girls, we just need to work better at being a team and just really communicating," she said. "Honestly, I think the most frustrating thing is the base running. We just need to trust ourselves. I tell them this all the time, they need to believe in themselves that they're better than they think they are."

The Foxes, now 3-7 this season, began the day by crushing Putnam Valley 19-2, led by catcher Katie Cristiano, who had three hits, including two doubles, and scored four times. Quoya Schnell and Hannah Getman chipped in with a pair of hits apiece, but Licata was also impressed by what she saw offensively from her entire lineup.

"We did a great job," she said. "We were hitting the ball really well. We really did well


long two-run triple over the head of Getman in center.

By the time the Foxes came to bat in the sixth, they were trailing 14-0. They put two runners aboard with just one out, but




Fox Lane shortstop Quoya Schnell gets set to throw to home plate after tagging out Hen Hud's Isabella Busceto on a double-steal attempt.

Despite being blanked by the Sailors, Licata remains pleased with what her hitters have displayed so far, while also hoping their softball instincts improve down the road.



Second baseman Lyla Loria stays ready for a pickoff throw during Fox Lane's loss to Hen Hud in the tournament final.




Victoria Bodine of Fox Lane hits a line drive to first base leading off the second inning in Saturday's tournament final at Sprout Brook Park.

Bobcats Find More Disappointment at Hendrick Hudson

For the second time in less than a week, the Byram Hills boys' lacrosse team found itself on the losing end of a nail-biting finish early Saturday afternoon.

Despite four goals from Michael Oronzio and two apiece by Benny Rakower and Reid Du'Toit, the Bobcats fell to host Hendrick Hudson 10-9. Sailor junior Dean Hiltsley's fifth goal of the day with just over four minutes remaining turned out to be the difference as Byram Hills closed its week with another frustrating defeat after losing to Arlington in the final seconds just five days earlier.

The Bobcats, now 5-3 this season, had jumped out to a 2-0 advantage over Hen Hud nearly two and a half minutes into the game with Oronzio finding the back of the net twice within a span of 36 seconds. The Sailors finally managed to get on the board on a goal from Scott Lupi with 5:24 remaining in the opening quarter. By the time the period was over, they had added goals from Rocco Capicotti and Hiltsley to grab a 3-2 edge.

Byram Hills nearly tied the game with four minutes left in the half as a missile from Gavin Javorsky caromed off the pipes. But

just over a minute later, Javorsky sent a cross-field pass to his left to Rakower, who beat goalie Rowan Caffrey with a shot to the near side. In the final 30 seconds of the half, Hen Hud came out of a timeout and Hiltsley restored the Sailors' one-goal lead by dashing in from behind the cage and scoring from an extreme angle on the right side an instant before he tumbled to the turf.

Just as they did to open the game, the Bobcats began the second half with a couple of quick goals, starting with Oronzio's third of the game 47 seconds into the third quarter. Just over two minutes into the period, Sean Siegel spun free in front for a shot that was deflected by Caffrey. The rebound went high in the air, where it was scooped up by Siegel and deposited into the cage to give Byram a 5-4 lead

With 6:45 to go in the third quarter, the

Bobcats opened up a two-goal advantage as Oronzio took a pass from Rakower, moved forward a few steps and then rifled a shot past Caffrey. Unfortunately for the Bobcats, their run of three straight goals soon ended as Hen Hud won the ensuing face-off and Ryan Clark sent a shot between the legs of goalie Jack Quinn.

A pair of goals by Hiltsley just 16 seconds apart gave Hen Hud a lead it never lost again. With 3:24 left in the quarter, Capicotti, who finished with three goals, scored from the left doorstep, the Sailors' second man-up goal of the period. But the Bobcats stopped the four-goal Sailor run with 49.6 seconds left as Javorsky found DuToit open just right of the crease, and they began the fourth quarter trailing 8-7.

Another Capicotti goal in the first minute of the final period with the Sailors having a

two-man advantage was quickly matched 55 seconds later by Rakower, who somehow managed to find the back of the net even though he was shoved to the turf from behind and landed on the goalie in the crease.

The Bobcats had several chances to tie again, but two blistering shots by Javorsky and one from Oronzio went wide. Then with 4:14 left, Hiltsley's final goal gave Hen Hud a two-goal cushion. Rakower, who had four goals in Byram's 8-6 home win over Fox Lane under the lights on Thursday evening, threaded a pass to DuToit on the right doorstep for a goal with 2:42 left, cutting the Sailors' lead back to one.

A Hen Hud turnover with 45 seconds to go gave the Bobcats one last chance to get even, but Javorsky misfired on a long shot with 23 seconds remaining and then his rocket toward the cage from the left side with nine seconds on the clock was somehow fielded by Caffrey, who then sent the ball all the way down the field as time expired on the Byram bid to force overtime.








