# Harney Scores 5G in Mahopac's Class B Playoff Win over Somers

# Indians to Face Rye in Semis, Yorktown to Battle John Jay

We specifically told you in this space last week that the outcome of No.4 SOMERS vs. No.5 MAHOPAC was going to come down to the grunts in the trenches, and there was no bigger grunt on the field than Mahopac senior FOGO Chris Evans, who completely destroyed any and all comers at the X in Coach Jon Bota's Indians' 11-5 Class B quarterfinal win over the shellshocked Tuskers last Thursday.

Evans has been improving since the season began, starting to look more and more like his brother, Andrew, another dominant FOGO at Mahopac. Evans took every draw for Mahopac and won 15 of 20, helping the Indians (12-5) get off to a 5-0 lead before the Tuskers (11-6), who beat the Indians 10-7 in the regular season, knew what hit them.

"I was locked in," Evans said. "The coaches had us motivated today and I just took care of business. Anything's possible if we play like we did today.'

Evans and Mahopac wing Chris Morris had everything to do with setting up West Point-bound senior A Mike Harney (5G), junior Gavin Viglucci (3G) and junior Jake Degnan (2A), who spotted the Indians a 5-0 lead after the first and 7-2 at halftime.

'We really wanted to come out here early and put it to Somers," Harney admitted. "We executed perfectly. We're a different team now than we were the first time we saw them. We didn't want the ground balls, didn't want to be checked last time. All that changed, and now we're playing Mahopac lacrosse. We're going to Nugent (at Rye) and

we're going to put it on them, too."

Coach Bota, a key member of Mahopac's last title winner back in 2011, has his team peaking at the right time, which is key with the Indians set to take on No.1 Rye in last night's semi.

"They found ways to battle back in transition, finding ways to score on the break," Bota said. "In regards to Evans, it's mainly what he does now after winning the faceoffs that's the difference. His decision making is much better now. He's handling those pressure situations much better now,"

Mahopac G Tommy Jacobellis (9 saves) stood tall between the pipes and All-Section senior D Sean Masset was a hound on GBs, causing a handful of turnovers while sparking transition.

"The defense followed Massett's lead and was stout, putting up a shutout in that first quarter," Bota said. "Most of their goals

were let up in transition. This was a big win for the team. We executed the game plan with poise and conviction. Evans dominated heavily, winning ground ball after ground his back. His play has helped escalate our offenses and defense, allowing them to operate much more efficiently. I was very impressed by his decisions after winning the faceoff. Harney was a master, controlling the game and sticking five big goals.

"Gavin Viglucci, Danny Koch, Luke Kelleher and Ryan Geohagen were unselfish on the offensive side, poised with their decisions. Chris Morris and Steve Perrone held it down while at short-stick D-mid with two-way play. Jack Elliot has been playing big for us at the LSM position, which allows us to apply pressure. Tommy Jacobellis has been heating up as the season went on standing tall for this team. Shout out to the bench mob who has been a large part of

hat tricks from sophomore Drew Weissman (1A), who now has 30 points on the year, Harry Griff (38G, 33A on the season) and Ryan Vogel (1A). Jake Baker was cooking, too, bagging two goals for the Huskers (9-8). The entire offense was sizzling behind FOGO Jason Fastiggi, who has won 64% of his 318 draws this season. He stole 24 faceoffs against Greeley to help set up last night's semifinal round against No.3 John Jay CR, ranked No.9 in NYS. State-ranked (No.7) Yorktown, the 40-time Section 1 champs who have not been crowned since 2017, will need more of that type of scoring balance as the top poles in Class B look to lock off Griff, the All-American attack.

No.8 LAKELAND/PANAS dropped an 18-4 hammer on visiting No.9 Clarkstown South in the opening round of the tournament, but was eliminated in Thursday's quarterfinal round by defending champion Rye, 12-3.

Against South, senior A Nick Graap crushed five goals and an assist for the Rebels (7-11), who led 11-1 at the half. Nic Connetta (3G, 2A) and Joe Alleva (4G) were major contributors, but the well ran dry against the state-ranked (No.3) Garnets.

Graap finished his career with a pair of goals and Aleva added a third for a Rebel squad that had its fair share of adversity this season due to injury.

No.7  $\boldsymbol{HEN}$   $\boldsymbol{HUD}$  is Final 4-bound after Coach Troy Lepore's Sailors (11-6) upset No.2 Tappan Zee, 9-7 behind a five-point night from Dean 'The Dream' Hiltsley. Tied at 2-2, Hiltsley's Sailors went on 5-0 tear that had them up 7-2 headed into the second half. TZ Coach Andrew McIntosh, of Putnam Valley and Oneonta fame, saw his state-ranked (No.17) Dutchmen roar back with four unanswered in the third, before Sailor senior Rocco Capitcotti scored the game-clinching goal to make it 8-6. Cap and Tyler Robinson had three points apiece while Thomas Popolizio added one goal and two assists and Scott Lupi scored once for the Sailors, who advanced to last night's semis against No.6 Pelham, ranked No.13 in NYS. A win would put the Sailors in the finals for the first time since 2012 and the second time since 2005 when Coach Lepore's Sailors stumbled in the finals.

One can only imagine the scene at Fulgum's Bar in Montrose should the Sailor laxmen keep the good times rolling, just as the girls' lax and softball teams have. Hen Hud is having a banner spring and Fulgum's could be a hot spot across the street from campus should the Sailors continue this bountiful three-sport campaign that has

"Big W for sure," Lepore said. "It felt

good to get one over them when it meant the most. It was a good, fun high school lacrosse game. We love playing and competing against Coach Mac, Murray and their team. Big one against Pelham in the next one on Monday."

Hiltsley slayed Eastchester in the opening round, scoring six times in a 15-4 rout of the 10gh-seeded Eagles, the Sailors first postseason win since 2018. Capicotti went for three of Hen Hud's first six and Popolizio added a goal and dished three assists. Ryan Clark and Lupi each scored twice.

"Capicotti got us on the board with a big GB and individual effort for the goal and followed it up with an assist to Hiltsley, and Capicotti scored three of our first sis. Cole Pritchard kept the ball away from Eastchester with a great day at the faceoff X. Feels good but we have bigger goals we hope to accomplish."

No.4 **PUTNAM VALLEY** had No.5 **BYRAM HILLS** reeling, but Michael Oronzio's fourth goal of the game with 20 seconds left preserved a 10-9 triumph for the visiting Bobcats (11-5).

PV was up 9-8 3:01 to go when the Tigers (12-6) got a 2-minute unreleasable penalty, followed by an offsides and a slashing penalty, which led to two Byram goals.

With nine seconds left, Tiger Ryan Denike

# No.8 Hen Hud's Espinoza Nips No.1 Yorktown in Class A Quarters, 1-0

## No.2 Class AA Carmel Moves on, No.2 Mahopac Ousted in Class A

Alana Espinoza was in no rush as she took the circle for eighth-seeded **HEN HUD** in the Section 1 Class A quarterfinal game against top-seeded and undefeated **YORKTOWN**, the 2021 runner-up to Lakeland.

The Hen Hud senior, who lost Yorktown, 3-1, during the regular season, was focused on pitching her team to victory.

"I was definitely nervous going into both games, playing against one of the best teams in Section 1," Espinoza said. "But, I didn't rush my pitching and instead of letting nerves take over, my determination did instead."

Espinoza responded with one of the finest pitching performances of the season, throwing a three-hitter with eight strikeouts in a 1-0 upset of the state-ranked (No.3) Huskers.

It was the second consecutive shutout for Espinoza, who blanked state-ranked (No.17) and No.9 seed Nanuet, 5-0, in a first-round game.

Hen Hud, now 15-6 this season, travels to No.5 Harrison, today, 4:30 in a semifinal. Harrison eliminated No.4 Pearl River. The other semifinal has No.7 Tappan Zee, who upset No.2 Mahopac, playing at No.3 Ursuline. The semifinal winners play for the title, Saturday, 1 p.m., at North Rockland.

Espinoza's outing was outstanding considering she held a potent Yorktown offense scoreless. To boot, Espinoza did not get intimidated facing Yorktown's Maya Servedio, one of the state's foremost pitchers this season. Espinoza knew she would have to be at her best and focus on every pitch

"When battling another pitcher in a close game, sometimes my mind can go all over the place," said Espinoza, who singled and scored. "It's definitely scary, but having an amazing team to back me up helps ease my mind and let me relax in stressful situations."

Despite the regular-season loss to Yorktown, Espinoza chose not to overthink her approach and pitch choice in the quarterfinal. Instead, she kept it simple.

"I wasn't too heavy on any particular pitch," Espinoza said. "I know Yorktown is an amazing hitting team 1 through 10, so I tried to mix it up to catch them off balance and use the corners of the plate to my advantage."

Hen Hud Coach Will Mauro had one goal in mind going into the game.

"We wanted to keep Servedio and Selvaggi from beating us at the plate and Alana was able to do that," Mauro said. "After the third and fourth innings I suggested we start looking for Alana's changeup early in the count."

While Espinoza was silencing Yorktown's offense, Hen Hud was making contact against Servedio.

"We started to put bats on the ball against Maya and I think it helped us," Mauro said. "Maya is excellent and you need a break against her. We got a baserunner and a wild pitch, which really set up that inning. Alana has good speed and instincts as a baserunner. Lexi Schaffer did a great job putting the ball in play and we scratched out a run."

While others may consider this a huge upset, Mauro felt his team was ready for the challenge because it played a difficult regular-season schedule.

Espinoza and her teammates enjoyed the moment, but understand the focus shifts to Harrison.

"We're all still smiling after the win, but going into

the semis we are ready to stay locked in," Espinoza said. "We haven't made it this far in quite some time and I really think this is our chance to prove ourselves. Winning against such an amazing team like Yorktown is an unforgettable feeling, but we need to stay focused on what's in front of us."

Espinoza also tossed a three-hitter, against Nanuet in the first round, and struck out 12. Sydney Muranaka hit a solo home run.

**CARMEL** was anxious to return to the softball diamond. The Rams concluded the regular season, received the No.2 seed

in the Section 1 Class AA Softball Championships and with it, a bye.

Carmel was scheduled to play

its quarterfinal game, Saturday, but rain forced the Mamaroneck-Port Chester game to be halted twice. As a result, the first-round game was concluded Saturday, which forced the Mamaroneck-Carmel quarterfinal to Sunday.

Instead of a relaxing Sunday, Carmel hosted Mamaroneck, Sunday at 10:30 a.m., and came away with a 5-2 win. Ram P Alyssa Zangrilli scattered seven hits and struck out 12. Sasha Ramdat had three hits, Sadie Zion added two hits and two RBI and Hailey Basso and Mandy Fernandez each had two


"I was happy that we played even though Sunday is typically a rest day," Zangrilli said. "I was getting anxious to play after a week without games."

"The deciding factor in the game was our inability to string hits together," said Yorktown pitcher Maya Servedio. "We had some big hits, but sadly not with runners in scoring position. Alana (Espinoza) pitched a great game. You have to tip your cap in those situations."

Servedio was a major reason Yorktown had an outstanding season. The Colgatebound senior was one of the most dominant pitchers in NYS, finishing the season with well over 200 strikeouts and surpassing 400 for her twoyear varsity career.

While Servedio was racking up strikeouts and limiting teams to one run, if any, her teammates were among the section leaders in runs scored.

"This season was extremely special," said Servedio, who will major in Economics at Colgate. "This was my first opportunity to play a full high school season that wasn't shortened by COVID. To go 18-1 in the season was truly incredible and I'm beyond proud of my entire team for

proud of my entire team for all that we accomplished."


What made this season especially memorable for Servedio was the life-long friendships the seniors will always have.

"It meant so much to accomplish what we have with girls I've been playing with since I was six years old," Servedio said. "They are the best people I know and I'm going to miss them all so much when we go our separate ways."




# No.12 Somers Advances to Class A Semis for 1st Time Since 2011

consideration last Wednesday. No.4 Class AA CARMEL was wiped out 7-0 by visiting No.12 WHITE PLAINS, and fourth-seeded CLASS A BYRAM HILLS was skunked at home by surging No.12 SOMERS, 11-2.


And the Tuskers, as of press time Monday morning, were the lone team from the Northern Westchester/Putnam region standing, as they steamrolled into the Class A semis with an 8-1 win over No.9 host Nanuet in the four-team double elimination semifinals.

Yes, baseball can be brutally cruel, and that is why many consider it the toughest of all championships to win.


#### **CLASS A**

The brackets weren't just busted; one side of it was completely shredded when Panas and Byram Hills were sent packing. Somers has had a most impressive run, going 10-3 over the last 13 games. Coach Anthony Nappi's Tuskers (12-9) have seen great efforts from ace Stefan Swee all season long, but he may have pitched his finest game to date against a sensational Byram Hills program. Swee went the distance, allowing no earned runs while scattering seven hits. He whiffed three, walked one and pitched to contact behind a tight defense.

"Swee was great and our defense has been the difference," Coach Nappi said. "Beginning of the year we would have one inning where a mistake or two cost us, and we've done a much better job limiting the damage if a mistake happens. We've always felt like we were close to making a run and right now we're believing in ourselves and

Tusker junior OF Ravi Dass set a mean table, and both he and senior SS Matt Kapica both went 4 for 5. Kapica (2 runs, 2 RBI), Dass (3 runs) and senior John Roublick (3 for 4, 4 RBI, 2 runs) came up huge.

Somers freshman RHP Andrew Kapica maneuvered through five tough innings without an earned run allowed in the win over Nanuet, striking out five.

"He battled through," Nappi said. "Andrew didn't have his best stuff, but I'm so proud of him and this team to be where we are right now."

His older brother, Matt, a shortstop by trade, did have his best stuff in the seventh. Matt Kapica struck out the side to finish the game and advance Somers to its first semifinal since 2011. A win last night over

for the Class A crown.

Tusker Brandon Iorizzo (2 hits, 2 walks, 2 RBI) and John Roublick (3 hits, 3 runs) sparked the Somers offense.

Previously, Somers knocked off No.5 Pearl River, 4-2, behind a solid outing from P George Creighton. The junior hurler went six strong innings, allowing two runs while fanning eight to earn the W. Andrew Kapica picked up the save. After inheriting three runners in the bottom of the seventh, the younger Kapica induced a double play and a strikeout to end what was a major threat.

Junior C Evan Carway cracked a key tworun dinger for the Tuskers while Dass had two hits and a walk to score a run. Junior DH Eddie Baranowski had two hits and drove home a run.


"I'm just so proud of this team," Nappi said. "We had a ton of adversity to start the year and we were left for dead after a 3-6 start. We fought to get where we are now."

No.11 YORKTOWN took out No.6 Harrison, 1-0, in eight innings when ace Matt Alduino fired a two-hitter with 13 whiffs for the best win of his career. 
























