## Panas Nips Lakeland in Pair of Wins; Somers, Yorktown Split

# Don't Sleep on Ossining; Croton's Rosen Notches 100th Win

If LAKELAND can run with WALTER PANAS like the Hornets did in a pair of one-run, nail biting losses last week, Class A baseball is going to be mighty interesting come postseason. In fact, first-year Coach Justin McCarthy's Hornets (6-10) had veteran Coach Anthony Fata's Panthers (13-1) on the ropes – leading 2-0 through six frames – in Friday's 3-2 come-from-behind Panas win; until Clemson-bound SS Sam Stafura mashed a bases-clearing double in the top of the seventh and ECU-bound P Jackson DiLorenzo slammed the door shut in the bottom half.

"Sammy came up huge," Fata understated. "And Jackson gutted out the win."

There were impressive players all over the field, including five D-I-bound Panthers, but another player in green and gold truly stood out, that being eighth-grade Hornet sensation Devin Diaz. If Diaz, a C/3B by trade, was to stay at Lakeland, he'd draw rare comparisons to 1989 Hornet C Ben Lindsey, who was drafted by the Minnesota Twins out of Lakeland High. Diaz is of that ilk, which is why prep schools are on the hunt and Iona Prep is in the lead.

At the core of its program, Lakeland has always had some prime time players; most recently BC-star Joey Vetrano and Evan Berta, but no Hornet has ever seen the varsity diamond as an eighth-grader, including Lindsey, until Diaz, who already looks the part of a D-I prospect, this spring.

"He's an absolute stud," said McCarthy, who played at Lakeland alongside two-time NYS Gatorade Player of the Year Jonathan de Marte back in 2010-11. "If he stayed with us, he'll go down in history as one of the best to ever play at a super successful baseball program."

Many think the grass is greener at prep schools, but scouts will find prospects

no matter where they play, which is why it's more important to play where you're comfortable, but this kid looks like he can play anywhere, including the next level.

Panas senior Aidan Cohall, who pitched the Panthers to a blustery 3-2 victory in the series opener with Lakeland, and Austin Pagliettini had two hits each in the win over the Hornets while Diaz scored a run.

In a 5-4 win over Pelham, Panas P Gavin Carlucci pitched six strong innings and Anthony Jaeschke earned the save. Travis Carlucci added two RBI while Stetson-bound C Danny Witters and BCU-bound OF Tony Humphrey, who transferred to Panas out of Iona Prep after a racially sensitive comment from an Iona Prep assistant A.D., each added an RBI.

Lakeland opened the week with a 4-3 extra-inning win over host White Plains when Justin Ramos drove home the winning run in the top of the eighth. Jason Portella drew a bases-loaded walk in the seventh to force extra innings. Joe Torres clouted a two-run home run and starter AJ Passafiume allowed two earned runs in seven innings and Ryan Done pitched the eight to notch

the save.

"Three one-run games (for the week)," McCarthy said. "We're getting there."

Panas has several big tests to close out the regular season, including a dustup with reigning Class AA champion **CARMEL** and a pair with border rival **HEN HUD**, who handled **BREWSTER**, 8-3 when P Kieran Plunkett lasted five innings for the win. Closer Josh Shea recorded the final six outs for Hen Hud, who will memorialize the life and times of longtime former pitching coach Ed Lent Sr. Saturday, May 7th for a 1:30 p.m. ceremony and a 2 p.m. game against visiting Lakeland at Sunset Field.

Connor 'Big Country' Harbolic stroked the game-winning hit for the Sailors in a 3-2 ninth-inning walk-off win over Lourdes to open the week, but the youthful Sailors (9-7) missed out on the sweep of the Warriors and then fell to visiting Pearl River, 13-8, as well.

SOMERS had a big league week, going 3-1 to improve to 7-6-1, adding to the parity throughout Class A. The week ended in a 1-0 setback to YORKTOWN Saturday, salvaging a split of the series, and the Tuskers did manage to sweep MAHOPAC earlier in the week.

"We played really well this week," Somers Coach Anthony Nappi said. "Our pitching was phenomenal all week. We let up four runs and just two were earned. George Creighton, Stefan Swee and Andrew Kapica were tough as nails."

Freshman Kapica pitched a no-hitter in a 10-0 win over the Indians (4-11), a game shortened to five innings by mercy rule. He added two RBI while Kapika's brother, senior SS Matt, came up strong for his kid



bro, delivering four RBI on two hits (12B).



Yorktown's Derek Patrissi earned the win, scattering four hits over five frames while whiffing six. Cole Haddock chalked up the save with two innings of scoreless relief, allowing just a hit while fanning four.

"He deserved better but sometimes baseball is a funny game," Nappi said. "We lost to a good team, so there's no shame in that."



"Nothing makes sense in Class A, so expect the unexpected," Hen Hud Coach Van Vourliotis






Somers junior Ravi Davis sparks yet another rally in Tuskers' 10-0 win over host Mahopac Wednesday.

Just ask defending Section 1 champion **CARMEL**, which has gone 0-4 against Arlington and JJEF, with RCK on the horizon. Coach Joe Hackert's Rams (9-6, 3-6) were an easy mark for Arlington last week, dropping a pair by a combined 21 runs, 11-0 and 10-0, after opening the week with a 6-3 win over North Rockland where P Nevin Scaperotti picked up the win and IF Kevin Heffernan drove home two runs.



#### Yorktown Adds John Jay to List of Conquests; Somers Falls to Byram

Scrutiny is part of the contract when you sign on with state-ranked (No.12) YORKTOWN. It comes with the territory when you're held to the standards of a 40-time Section 1 and seven-time NYS champion. We told you last week in this very space things like "Yorktown has lost four in a row, but don't be fooled into thinking Coach Tim Schurr's state-ranked (No.4) Huskers (4-5) are not prime-time players for the Section 1 Class B crown," and that "We're not going to panic on the Huskers, who traditionally play an extremely tough schedule, until we see what happens later today, though a loss to John Jay would give cause for concern."

And what we saw last Tuesday in the Huskers' 10-4 victory over the visiting Wolves was a reminder that when things are clicking and April turns to May Yorktown will be one of the last two teams standing in Class B, for nearly 50 years. The Huskers (now 6-5 overall, 6-2 in Section 1) added John Jay to the list of prime-time Section 1 Class B challengers they've now beaten this season, including MAHOPAC and SOMERS. And they will likely add LAKELAND/PANAS to that list on May 7 at the annual Charlie Murphy Cup game.

## Yorktown, Hen Hud, Mahopac Among Class A's Elite

Alana Espinoza knew she would have to be at her best when she stepped into the circle against 2021 Section 1 Class AA champion MAHOPAC. The HEN HUD senior focused on one thing, staying in control.

"I've struggled a bit with controlling my pitches this season, and I knew when facing a good team like Mahopac that they'd take advantage of that," Espinoza said. "My main focus was to throw strikes and stay calm in the circle."

Espinoza accomplished this as she held the high-powered Mahopac offense in check, and her teammates supplied the runs. Hen Hud erupted for six runs in the top of the eighth inning to back Espinoza's four-hit, 10-strikeout performance in a 7-1

Along with the victory, what pleased Espinoza the most was she did not issue a walk. Taeghan Dapson supplied the decisive hit in the eighth. She battled Mahopac pitcher Ava Lichtenberger for nine pitches before delivering a run-scoring single.

"After playing with Taeghan since I was eight, it's safe to say she is definitely not one to give up," Espinoza said. "Taeghan is an amazing example on how to approach the game even when under pressure like she was in that at-bat. She stayed relaxed, but still fought to start up a rally in the last

The eighth-inning uprising was a result of Espinoza's performance. Espinoza realized early her pitches were on the rise.

"I was very happy with my riseball and felt confident enough to use it on both sides

of the plate," Espinoza said.

Espinoza and Lichtenberger established themselves early, quickly transforming the game into a pitchers' duel before both teams scratched out their respective runs in the

"From the start of the game we knew it was going to be a battle, but I felt like we did an amazing job keeping our heads in it and picking each other up wherever we needed it which kept our confidence level high.

"This win was definitely important to us. We were able to prove our ability against a top team and we kept each other focused and hyped all game.'

Emma Morley and Dapson each had two hits and a RBI. Isabella Buscetto and Lexi Schaffer had a hit and RBI apiece.

Hen Hud, now 8-3 this season, opened the week with a 9-0 loss to Pearl River. The game resumed where it was suspended because of rain.

The Sailors rebounded with a 13-4 victory over 2021 Section 1 Class A titleist Lakeland.

Espinoza struck out 12 and allowed two runs in six innings. She aided her cause with two hits and two RBI.

Ja'Nae Walker supplied the power with three hits, including a home run, and four

RBI. Dapson had two hits and scored twice and Lisa Marie Pasquale drove in two runs.

MAHOPAC wielded the aluminum in victories over John Jay-Cross River (11-2) and Brewster (14-6) before a tough 7-1 loss in eight innings to hen Hud.

Despite the setback, Ava Lichtenberger continued her excellent season as Mahopac's No. 1 pitcher, surpassing 100 strikeouts to date.

It is always difficult to be the successor to an outstanding, impact player. However, Licthenberger learned from one of Section 1's all-time pitching greats - Shannon Becker, now Notre Dame's No.1. This helped prepare Lichtenberger for the season.

That's not to say there isn't work to be done, because, quite frankly, Yorktown can't and won't rest on its laurels when it hasn't been crowned Section 1 champs since 2017. But they did look like a team that could challenge for its 41st title against John Jay, and then again back on April 16 in a twogoal loss to reigning Class B champion Rye in what was a back-and-forth affair before the Garnets took over in the fourth. And, certainly, they looked special in a one-goal, double OT loss to nationally-ranked Darien on April 19, so when it all comes together this unit has had its moments. And they'll need more consistency starting next week when they take on Wilton (CT), state-ranked No.3 Class D Briarcliff, Lakeland/Panas and Ridgefield (CT).

Against John Jay (8-4, 8-3), Yorktown scored three times within a minute to grab a 3-0 lead, but allowed the Wolves to come back at 3-all and 4-all before scoring six unanswered.

Lefty sophomore Drew Weissman scored three goals and looks the part of a true finisher. Senior A James Solazzo continued to put up big numbers, adding a hat trick for goals 15, 16 and 17 on the year. Senior All-American A Harry Griff (22G, 22A) went for two goals and a helper, giving him a teamhigh 44 points through 10 games. Senior M Sava Makarenko and sophomore M Ryan Vogel bagged a goal apiece and dished an assist. Senior M Jason Fastiggi was a huge key for the Huskers, winning 11 faceoffs, and

senior G Vito DeBellis notched eight saves.

Yorktown finished off the week with a 13-5 win over Carmel behind junior A Jack Duncan (4G, 2A) and Griff (3G, 3A) Husker senior Jack Baker netted a career-high three goals and sophomore Connor Fastiggi scored twice while his senior brother Jay Fastiggi owned the draw box (won 17 of 20 faceoffs).

Class A CARMEL came across the reservoir to MAHOPAC last Wednesday and were greeted rudely by a barrage of firstquarter goals, including tallies from Indians John Kearney (from Jake Degnan at 9:14), a pole goal from Liam Dodd pole at 7:33, plus a pair of cranks in the final 21 seconds from Michael Harney and Mike Rettberg (1A). It wasn't much of a game after that as the Indians went up 12-2 before the Rams (7-5) tacked on a few late goals with seconds and thirds on the field to make it look closer than it was, 12-6, Mahopac senior M Chris Evans set a dominating tone in the draw box, winning 16 of 17 faceoffs while Army-bound senior A Harney (1A) finished with a hat trick. Junior A Degan (2A) and sophomore Kearney (2A) each scored twice for the Indians (8-4 in Section 1, 9-4 overall), who continue to OWN their crosstown rivals on the lax green. Mahopac neutralized Ram hotshot Matthew Risley (24 G, 18A for the year). Thomas Connolly is second for the Rams with 37 points this season.

Luke Kelleher and Gavin Viglucci also scored for Mahopac, which added a 6-2 win over Wappingers Friday behind Degnan (2G, 1A for 34 points this season), Harney (2G, 1A), Gavin Viglucci (2G), and Danny Koch 1A. Since losing 10-7 to Somers, Mahopac has now won four in a row and will finish with three huge tests against Class A heavy's Arlington and state-ranked (No.3) Mamaroneck and another with Class C Hen Hud

Just days after moving past state-ranked (No.12) Yorktown in the state rankings, No.10 **SOMERS** suffered an 8-7 loss to Class C **BYRAM HILLS**. The Tuskers (10-2) were led by senior T.J. Olifers' two goals and three helpers for 36 points on the season. Henry Ellison also scored twice for Somers, which failed to neutralize Bobcat Michael Oronzio (3G, 4A). Somers chalked up a 9-3 win over **FOX LANE** when Olifiers, Nick Newman and Ryan Brush each scored twice.

LAKELAND/PANAS got itself on track with a 14-8 win over OSSINING last Wednesday when senior Nick Graap went for a career-high 11 points, including nine goals and two assists. Justin Stabile (2G, 2A), Will Moore (2G, 1A) and Nic Connetta (1G, 3A) all finished with multiple points.

#### CLASS C/D

If **CROTON** had a book on **PUTNAM VALLEY** senior Andrew Dzubak, they should burn it after the Tiger attackman went for a career-high 11 points (8G, 3A) in a 16-11 win over visiting Croton last Wednesday. Dzubak was in sync with fellow senior and offensive orchestrator Ryan Denike (1G, 4A, 40 points this season) as the Tigers improved to 7-5 overall.

"Andrew is under the radar, most teams forget about him because they zero in on Ryan," PV Coach Tim Weir said of Dzubak (31G, 11A for the year). "To make a long story short, Ryan and Andrew play an awesome two-man game."

Cole Doucher (2G, 1A), Hayden Gumbrecht (2G, 1A), Chris DeGiorgio (1G, 2A), Doug Brown (1G, 1A), Thomas Cunningham (1G) and Davin Porteus (17/30 on faceoffs), plus PV G Roger Raimo (10 saves) all played a major part for the Tigers (6-5, 7-5). Croton's Mike McCarthy (2G, 2A), Ryan Robine (2G, 1A), Noah Bonne (2G) and Bryce Laemer (2G, 1A) did all they could to keep Croton (4-6, 4-7) close, though it was 9-4 by the half and 13-6 after three.

PV followed that up with an 11-7 win over **KENNEDY CATHOLIC** in the Warrior Cup game Friday night. Gumbrecht (27 points this season) took home MVP honors after what amounted to a career day (2G, 4A). Denike (1G, 2A), Davin.Porteus (2G, 1A), Durocher (2G), DeGiorgio (2G), Dzubak (1G), Brown (1G) and Roger Raimo (11 saves ) all found the score sheet.

"It was our fifth time trailing at the half where we pulled the game out," said Weir, who is two wins shy of 200 career high school victories, the vast majority coming at Lakeland/Panas. "It was a great atmosphere in the Valley and we thank Kennedy for coming. I love the grit, desire and attitude of this team."

"I definitely learned from Shannon that not everything is going to go your way in games, especially when you're pitching and you can't let a couple of hits or misplay get to you," said Lichtenberger, the starting shortstop last year.

Becker would be proud of Lichtenberger who is currently 9-2 with a 1.09 earned run average. Lichtenberger has registered 109 strikeouts and yielded just 48 hits in 77 innings.

Lichtenberger did admit she was nervous having to take the place of Becker, but she quickly found her composure.

"I had to tell myself that I'm my own person and player and I'm definitely not expected to do as well as Shannon, but I was also excited to be filling her role and getting to come out and trying to have a great season like we did last year.

"I also had to tell myself that even though there is pressure to do well it's a brand new team and the expectations were not as high for us as they were last year. It was a fresh start and an opportunity to come out strong for Mahopac and myself."

The transition from shortstop to the circle was also smoother because Lichtenberger and catcher Gianna Lafaro play travel softball together.

"I've had the opportunity to work with Gianna for over a year now which really helps us have a great pitcher-catcher relationship," Lichtenberger said. "She was also one of my first friends after moving to Mahopac last year so we have a really good bond and we work really well together."

Lafaro led the offense against John Jay with a 210-foot home run and three RBI. Lichtenberger helped herself with three RBI and she also struck out 12.

Lafaro was the offensive catalyst against Brewster with two doubles and four RBI. Gaby Marino drove in three runs and Mia Lanter and Caitlyn Wolf each had two RBI.

Mahopac owns a 9-3 record with eight games remaining before the Section 1 Class AA Softball Championship begins later this month. Lichtenberger and her teammates look to continue raising their level of play so they can peak for the postseason.







## **Briarcliff Overcomes a Slow Start to Defeat the Panthers**

After yielding a pair of goals in the first five minutes on Friday afternoon, the Briarcliff boys' lacrosse team sure made it a lot harder for the Panthers of Pleasantville to do any more celebrating.

In fact, the Panthers went nearly 40 minutes between their second and third goals of the day, a scoring drought they couldn't overcome, and wound up on the short end of a 6-3 decision to the archrival Bears in the annual Saw Mill Slugfest Cup. Elliot Jones and Jack Ricciardi both finished with two goals and an assist as Briarcliff maintained its perfect record against Section One foes and dealt the Panthers their fourth straight defeat.

"I think we're just slumping a little bit right now," said Panthers head coach Chris Kear, whose team had cruised to six successive wins to start the season. "You know how it is with offensive players. If you start missing a few shots and the goalie's making a few saves, it starts to get in your head a little bit. I think we just need a game where we break out of that slump and we'll be fine."

Despite just one victory over the previous two and a half weeks, the host Panthers were fired up as they huddled together one final time just before stepping on the field to challenge the mighty Bears. The game was nearly three minutes old when Ryan Challice moved around the back of the cage and got to the right side of the crease to send a shot past the Bears' Evan Van Camp, putting the Panthers in front 1-0.

The Bears never even touched the ball over the game's first three minutes and 45 seconds. When they finally did, their initial possession of the sunny, breezy afternoon ended with quite a surprise — Brandon Rispoli's blistering shot from straightaway that seemingly tied the score with 7:17 to go in the opening quarter was disallowed by the officials because the head came flying off his stick.

"I've never seen that where the goal's already done and we're ready to take a face-off and they disallow it," said Bears coach Al Meola. "That was bizarre. The stick broke, what are you supposed to do?"

Adding to the Bears' frustration, just 20 seconds later Nick Reich converted off an unsettled situation at midfield to increase Pleasantville's lead to 2-0. But Briarcliff's sagging fortunes didn't last long. A Panther turnover paved the way for Rispoli to find the back of the net, for keeps this time, cutting the Bears' deficit to 2-1 with 5:43 remaining in the first period.

With just under two minutes left, Ricciardi, from just left of the crease, got a pass from Lucas Proctor and sent the ball past goalie Ryan Raefski, tying the score. The contest remained even until Proctor put the Bears in front to stay, assisted by Ricciardi, with just 3:53 left on the scoreboard in the first half.

Raefski made a big save on a shot by Nico Santucci with two and a half minutes left in the half, and then just seconds before the

buzzer it was Van Camp's turn to come up big, somehow deflecting a potential gametying shot by the Panthers' Daniel Picart from the left doorstep that sent the teams off the field at halftime with Briarcliff ahead 3-2.

"We're always talking about those momentum goals," said the Panthers' Kear. "If we get a goal right before the half, that's a huge momentum goal. The goalie made a great save. Both goalies played tremendous today. So it was just one of those hard-fought defensive battles, and they just hit a few more shots than us."

An impressive save by Van Camp just over three minutes into the second half on a point-blank shot from Reich preserved the Bears' slim lead. Then with 5:38 remaining in the third quarter, Jones scored the first of his two goals, this one from right of the crease that the Panthers vehemently argued should have been waved off.

Another big save by Van Camp with three minutes to go in the third quarter enabled Briarcliff to start the fourth with a two-goal advantage. Ricciardi's second goal of the afternoon, a lefty sidewinder from left of the cage with 7:14 on the clock extended the Bears' lead to 5-2. Just over a minute later, a Santucci goal was waved off by the refs after he had spun his way to the right side of the

cage and deposited the ball in the net while tumbling to the turf.

"We had three disallowed goals, a couple of really nice plays," said Meola. "I'm gonna look at the tape and see if we were really in the crease. But I don't think we were. Whatever. I'm not gonna question the refs."

The Panthers' Challice, while falling to the ground from a wide angle right of the cage, sent a shot past Van Camp with 3:43 remaining in the game, trimming the Bears' lead to 5-3. But just over a minute later, Briarcliff ended any doubt about the outcome when Van Camp sent a clearing pass halfway down the field and Jones finished the lightning-quick break by easily scoring in front, first faking a shot high, then playfully sending it low past Raefski.

"We don't really like to say that we get moral victories here," said Kear, "but for a young team like we have, a couple of ninth-graders, a lot of sophomores, it is almost a moral victory to play a tight game like that with a really, really good team like Briarcliff. I think that will give us some confidence. Now they know they can do it. They saw

today, if they execute the game plan and they run their sets and they run their defensive matchups the right way, they can win big games."

Meanwhile, Briarcliff's Meola, whose team is now 9-2 this season after defeating Keio 13-0 a day later, is just glad the April portion of the Bears' schedule is finally behind them, with a bragging-rights victory over their crosstown rival helping usher in the month of May.

"Honestly, they outcompeted us," he said of the Panthers. "We found a way to win, but it wasn't pretty on our part. Hats off to them, they played great. A frustrating game for us. We've got to get better. A lot of guys have been banged up and sick. We need to get past this month and get healthy. Right now, we have a little bit of a break coming up and we need it badly. It couldn't come at a better time."

The Bears' regular season ends with a daunting lineup of rivals — Yorktown, Ridgefield, Stepinac and Bronxville — and having to adjust after losing star midfielder Matt Waterhouse to a season-ending injury early in the year just adds to the challenge.

"The last four games are gonna be tough," said Meola. "Let's hope we're rolling into sectionals ready to go."






Fox Lane's MaryKate Loveless turns up the field with the ball in the first half of Thursday evening's 11-6 win over Byram Hills.




Mallory McCarthy slices the ball toward left field in Westlake's 8-7 victory over visiting Valhalla last Wednesday afternoon.












