

Panthers' Reign Ends With a Semifinal Loss to Putnam Valley

It was a perfect storm of mental mistakes, an injury to quarterback Jack Howe and a stout Putnam Valley run game that derailed the Pleasantville Panthers' chances of repeating as section and state champions, as they fell to Putnam Valley on Friday evening in the Section 1, Class B semifinal playoff game.

"Our injuries and our mistakes were a lot to overcome, said Pleasantville head coach Tony Becerra after the Panther season had come to a disappointing end with a 36-25 home defeat to the unheralded Tigers at Parkway Field. "Not to take anything away from Putnam Valley. They were solid, so all the credit to them."

The second-seeded Panthers did start the game on a good note, making the first big play of the night. Halfway through the first quarter, Howe, being chased by multiple Tiger linemen, completed a long pass to Danny Minerva, setting up the Panthers at the Tiger 30-yard line. They would settle for a field goal, a 32-yarder by Howe with just under two minutes left in the period.

But the Panthers wouldn't hold their 3-0 lead for long. With Putnam Valley having the ball at the Panther 38-yard line and facing a fourth-and-five situation, the Tigers decided to go for it. An offside call against the Panthers gave the Tigers a big first down and set the stage for running back John Listwan's first of four touchdowns, a one-yard run that gave Putnam Valley its first lead of the night.

The Panthers would soon retaliate, though, as Howe connected with receiver Brendan O'Neill for a 30-yard touchdown pass. With the point-after kick by Howe, Pleasantville took a 10-6 lead. But Listwan

would match Howe's arm with his legs, and on the next possession he took the ball 40 yards to the end zone, giving Putnam Valley a 12-10 lead it would never relinquish the rest of the way.

A Panther turnover deep in their own territory led to another Tiger touchdown, this one on a short run by Darnel Shillingford that increased the Putnam Valley advantage to 18-10. The Tigers had a chance to really stretch their lead after a Howe pass toward the left sideline was picked off, but the Panther defense rose to the occasion and kept Put Valley from adding any more points.

With the ball just before halftime, Howe helped get the Panthers right back by completing a 60-yard pass to

running back Patrick Doherty. And with time expiring, Howe found Doherty in the left side of the end zone for 21-yard touchdown pass, bringing the chaotic half to a close with the Panthers trailing by just 18-17.

As the third quarter began, The Tigers continued to do what was working for them in the first half — giving the football to Listwan and letting him chew up yards on the ground. His touchdown romp from midfield enabled the Tigers to extend their lead to 24-17.

But perhaps the biggest play of the game came on the next Panther possession. With the ball at midfield, Howe scrambled out of the pocket and took off but a big hit by a Tiger defender sent him to the sideline where he was diagnosed with a concussion. After the play, the Panthers would get flagged for unsportsmanlike conduct and were forced to punt the ball.

But Pleasantville would stop the Tigers on the following possession and all eyes were suddenly on Panther freshman quarterback Michael LaCapria, who took over for the senior star, Howe. On third and five, LaCapria was set to hand off to running back Chris May, but the ball got bobbled on the transaction and was recovered by the Tigers as the P'ville turnovers continued to mount.

LaCapria would get the ball back again a bit later, but after two incompletions it was starting to become clear that the injury to Howe was too much to overcome for a Panther team that had already lost two vital offensive players for the season in recent weeks.

The Tigers would take over and quickly drive down the field. Shillingford capped off the drive with another score, giving Putnam Valley, which had already upset Nanuet in the quarterfinals, a 30-17 lead.

As time was beginning to wind down in Pleasantville, it was desperation time for the Panthers. But there would be no miracle as a LaCapria pass deep down the field was picked off by defensive back Joseph Ciofi. On the following play, Listwan, who wound up with nearly 300 yards on the ground, would run 73 yards to the end zone, sealing the game for the Tigers and putting an end to the Panthers' one-year reign as state champions.













Ardsley's Defense Smothers Westlake in the Semifinals

Jalen Leonard-Osbourne scored twice to lead the Ardsley offense, but it was the Panthers' defense that rose to the occasion to stop Westlake's ground game on a damp, drizzly Saturday night for a 28-6 victory in the Section 1, Class B semifinals at Edgemont High School.

The unbeaten and top-seeded Panthers (8-0), who lost to Westlake in last year's semifinals, rolled into next week's championship game where they will meet fifth-seeded Putnam Valley on Friday, November 2 at 4:30 p.m. at Mahopac High School.

Panthers quarterback Frankie Belarge, who completed 9 of 10 passes for 128 yards, kept the offense focused despite some early struggles to move the ball and a rash of holding penalties.

"We're always staying humble, taking one game at a time, respecting the opponent and not looking too far ahead," Belarge said. "I think that's why we have done so well so far this season. We had a great team in 2014 and we want to exceed their expectations, get the section title and achieve all of our goals."

Westlake stunned the crowd and Ardsley by opening the game with an on-sides kickoff and recovering the ball at the Panthers' 34-yard line to set up for an early score. But the Wildcats could not capitalize on their great field position. The Ardsley defense held and kept up the pressure throughout the game, shutting out the Wildcats until the final minute.

"We wanted to set the tone early and any time you get on the board first you get momentum for the rest of the game," Westlake quarterback Jason Ausiello said. "We just couldn't get going and both teams played good defense. It's hard to tell what was happening on the line. They were pushing hard on their side, trying to stop our running game. Our defense held them in the first half, too."

Leonard-Osbourne had the lone

touchdown in a tightly-played first half as both defenses gave up yards grudgingly. The fleet-footed running back rushed the ball 13 times for 74 yards and had two big runs negated by holding penalties. He scored from six yards out with nine seconds remaining in the first quarter and the extra point gave Ardsley a 7-0 lead that held up through the rest of the first balf

"All week, our scout team offense gave the defense the best look it could and we knew their playbook inside and out," Belarge said. "Our defense made no mistakes the past three days in practice. We felt really confident. Our line had a little trouble in the first half, but we made adjustments, talked about it at halftime and came out on top. Getting (Osbourne) going was important."

After intermission, the Panthers got their offense in gear. Osbourne scored from the 10-yard line to make it 14-0 with 6:20 left in the third quarter and

Ardsley added scores by Belarge and Brett Locciasano to stretch its lead to 27-0 midway through the fourth.

Westlake's lone score came on a touchdown pass from Ausiello to Dylan Ahearn with just 1:01 remaining in the game.

Ardsley defeated Putnam Valley 48-14 earlier this season with Belarge throwing three touchdown passes, making the top seed the favorite to win next week.

Westlake's Vincent Spaziante, who helped the Wildcats defeat defending state champion Pleasantville two weeks ago in the team's regular-season finale, was disappointed in the outcome, but proud of his team.

"No one works harder than this team," Spaziante said. "We played together as a family this year. We improved and stayed together. This was a really tough team to beat. We didn't let down at all. We're proud of our guys."
