

#### **Bobcats Overcome an Early Deficit to Beat Fox Lane**

Momentum changed hands in an instant on Saturday afternoon, and once it did the Byram Hills football team never gave it back.

Overcoming an 11-point first-half deficit, the Bobcats scored the game's final four touchdowns, routing visiting Fox Lane 34-17 on a breezy last day of summer. Sophomore running back Jack Weiler rushed for three touchdowns and the Byram Hills defense stymied the Foxes' ground game over the final three quarters as the Bobcats improved to 3-1 this season.

"Football's all about momentum," said Fox Lane head coach Bill Broggy following his team's third consecutive loss. "Obviously the momentum shifted from us to them."

Broggy's Foxes, trying to rebound from a lopsided shutout loss to Somers a week earlier, scored a touchdown on an 11-play, 57-yard drive on their first possession of the day and seemed to be firmly in control when Luca Friedman picked off a pass on the second play of the second quarter and ran 30 yards for a touchdown that stretched their lead to 17-6.

But just 19 seconds later, Bobcat sophomore tight end Steven Franco caught a pass from Jack Kenny, somehow eluded Fox Lane's Josh Olsen, then bolted down the right sideline all the way to the goal line for a 77-yard touchdown that turned around the course of the contest.

"Yeah, that killed us," conceded Broggy. "That killed us."

"For us to be able to answer back was huge and it gave our kids a lot of confidence," said Bobcat coach Doug Carpenter. "Steven Franco, it was his second fairly long touchdown of the year and he did a tremendous job securing the football, kind of skipping through a tackle and then running into the end zone. Obviously that was great because Fox Lane's really good and they've got some really special players."

Fox Lane, with a four-yard touchdown

run from Andrew Brown and a 25-yard field goal by Spencer Rowley in addition to Friedman's pick-six, held the lead for nearly the entire first half. But with just over a minute remaining in the second quarter, a Rowley pass deep in Bobcat territory was intercepted by Kenny, who returned it all the way to the Foxes' 36-yard line.

Just three plays later, Weiler broke through the line of scrimmage and scored on a 23-yard run that gave the Bobcats the lead for good. The point-after kick by Skyler Healy extended the Byram Hills lead to 20-17 at intermission.

"Oh, it was huge," said Carpenter about being able to leave the field at halftime with a four-point advantage. "At that point, I think it just had a huge impact on all three phases. Our kids settled in on defense. I think after their first couple drives we were a little bit nervous that we couldn't hang with them. They were really, really tough and physical, and then once we settled in our kids did a great job of executing the game plan. We had some guys that made some really special plays in really important spots."

One of those special plays came on the opening drive of the third quarter when a

Rowley screen pass under pressure from Franco was picked off by Cole Picca, who carried the ball down to the Foxes' sixyard line. Moments later, on first down, Weiler scampered right for his second touchdown and suddenly the Bobcats had a 10-point cushion.

"It was a good close game and we just made too many mistakes," said Broggy. "You can't make mistakes."

Fox Lane's Brown returned the ensuing kickoff 40 yards to the Bobcat 32-yard line, but on fourth-and-one, with Matt Bodine now calling signals for the Foxes, the Byram defense rose to the challenge and made a huge stop. Another opportunity for the Foxes would come with four minutes left in the third quarter when a booming 60-yard punt by Jayden Poellot pinned the Bobcats at their own one-yard line.

Unfortunately for the Foxes, they couldn't contain Weiler, who caught a pass from Kenny for a nine-yard gain, then had runs of 21 and 13 yards. By the time the Bobcats were forced to punt, they had crossed midfield and regained control of field position.

The Foxes' last gasp may have come three plays into the fourth quarter when

Poellot, on a fourth-and-nine play, was unable to pick up a first down after he faked a punt and threw a desperation screen pass. A flag was thrown against Fox Lane, but the Bobcats naturally declined the penalty.

They took over on the Foxes' 35 with 11:43 left in the game and, seven plays later, Weiler ran into the end zone from two yards out for his third touchdown of the afternoon. The PAT by Healy gave the Bobcats a 34-17 lead with just over eight and a half minutes left on the clock.

The Bobcats could start to celebrate their latest victory just past the midway point of the fourth quarter when a Bodine fourth-and-two pass to Brown near midfield sailed wide of the target. They soon used up most of the remaining time with seven consecutive running plays that advanced the ball to the Foxes' two-yard line before it was turned over on downs.

Nothing Broggy saw from the power running of the emerging star, Weiler,

came as much of a surprise to him.

"No, no, I've seen him on film," he said. "He's a real good back. We knew going in they're a good team with a good coach. So I'm not disappointed we lost to Byram Hills. I'm disappointed in the way we played. We just don't step up. We've got to start stepping up. We've just got to show up on Monday, put it behind us and just work harder."

For the Bobcats' Carpenter, the convincing win over the neighboring Foxes might help him sleep a bit better in the future. It seems he still has flashbacks to a game against Fox Lane back when he was in high school.

"I told the kids afterwards that when I was a senior at John Jay, Fox Lane was our rival and we lost to them," he said. "And I didn't play well. I think about it all the time. I see some of those guys and certainly it's nice to have those bragging rights."



#### Vikings Get Overwhelmed by the Dobbs Ferry Eagles

"Dominance" was the key word to describe the Dobbs Ferry football team's 41-0 lopsided victory over the Valhalla Vikings this past Friday night.

"Dobbs Ferry is a very well-coached team, probably the best team in Class C," said Vikings head coach Stephen Boyer. "It was a tough test for our team and they played hard until the final whistle."

Valhalla had no answer for the Eagles' run game, led by halfbacks Emilio Nolasco and Jack Baglieri. On Dobbs Ferry's first possession, the two backs were alternating big run after big run, each with a carry for over 20 yards. Senior halfback Awvise Khan put the finishing touch on the drive with a 12-yard touchdown, giving the Eagles an early 7-0 lead.

The Vikings started with the ball at their own 36-yard line, but did very little with it as they went three and out. When the Eagles got the ball back, they went right back to work. On the first play of their second drive, Nolasco took a handoff 70 yards to the house and Dobbs Ferry had a 14-0 lead just like that.

Needing to answer the Eagles

desperately, Valhalla back Mahari Davis Jr. had a long run for 35 yards, followed by a screen pass from freshman quarterback Michael Dawson to halfback Bryan Cusi that set up the Vikings at the 1-yard line. Unable to punch the ball in three straight times, the Vikings decided to go for it on fourth down instead of a field goal, only to be stuffed again at the goal line.

"We had trouble stopping them, so three points isn't going to do anything at that time," Boyer said. "We practice stuff that we do at the goal line and we tried to just run them over. Probably not a great choice on my part."

Unfortunately for the Vikings, that squandered opportunity would turn out to be their best chance to put points on the scoreboard for the rest of the game.

Taking over on the 1-yard line, the Eagles looked to prove that their offense is not one dimensional. Quarterback Patrick Straub had back-to back pass plays of over 20 yards to his top receiver, Tevaun Holness. On the first play of the second quarter, Straub found Holness again for a touchdown on a 22-yard pass play.

The Eagles lead was now up to 20-0, but


not for long. Holness soon scored again following a 36-yard pass from Straub as the Eagles extended their lead to 27-0. They would take a 34-0 halftime lead, finishing the half without punting the ball even once.

At the start of the third quarter, the pressure was on the Vikings to put some points on the board, but that task was too difficult with Eagle defensive ends Thomas Palicz and Justin Morgan wreaking havoc in the Vikings' backfield, sacking Dawson multiple times

On their first possession of the second half, the Eagles picked up right where they left off as



Running back Mahari Davis Jr. of Valhala carries the football during Friday's home game against the Dobbs Ferry Eagles.




Baglieri took a carry 70 yards for a touchdown, putting the game away before the fourth quarter even began.

According Boyer, it was the Dobbs Ferry edge in experience that played a big role in their domination of the game. The Eagles have 13 seniors, far more than the Vikings. However, Boyer believes his that team's inexperience can lead to opportunities in the future.

"It was a test of what is in front on us," he said. "This is a good example of what our squad will be in three years. This will be a goal for us to improve on. "




