## Despite Inclement Weather White Plains Memorial Day Goes On

Despite the poor weather, Monday morning's Memorial Day 5K Run/Walk in White Plains followed by a parade and ceremony went on as scheduled.

The Memorial Day 5K Run/Walk, the first to be held in White Plains, donated a portion of the proceeds to the Veterans Administration Hospital, Montrose. At the end of the run, a raffle was held where runners were given prizes such as free trial gym memberships to Lifetime Fitness and Blink.

Sponsors of the 5K included White Plains Hospital, The North Face, and White Plains Business Improvement District (BID). Timing for the event was provided by long-time White Plains business owner Andy Kimmerling of Westchester Road Runner.

The parade started at 10 a.m. on

Main Street in front of City Hall and continued onto North Broadway, and was immediately followed by the Memorial Day ceremony held at the White Plains Rural Cemetery. Former Marine Bob Donnelly spoke for the invocation at the ceremony, thanking everyone for attending despite the rain. There were roughly 100 attendees.

"It's a lousy day...so it overwhelms me to see you all here to honor those who made the ultimate sacrifice," Donnelly said in his speech.

Following Donnelly's speech, Cynthia Kauffman, president of The Daughters of Liberty's Legacy, read the poem "Flanders Field," by John McCrae.

Mayor Tom Roach gave the Memorial Day address, thanking sailors from the USS Kearsarge, as well as the Marines in attendance who had come up to

White Plains from their visit to New York City during Fleet Week.

Roach also proclaimed the day as "Poppy Day," a day for all citizens of White Plains to recognize the service of veterans by wearing a memorial poppy. He read a statement from Congresswoman Nita Lowey (D-Harrison):

"This Memorial Day, we honor the legacies of the women and men who died defending the United States and the freedoms we cherish. We owe these patriots our deepest debt of gratitude, one that we will never be able to fully repay. And as we salute our nation's fallen service members, we also keep their families and loved ones in our hearts. They too have made a great sacrifice, and it is our solemn duty to care for them and the millions of veterans still with us. Today, and every

## New Pedestrian Crosswalk Lights are Welcome in Greenburgh

The Town of Greenburgh has constructed numerous new sidewalks around the town and future new sidewalks are being planned.

Greenburgh Town Supervisor Paul Feiner has made the safety of children and pedestrians a priority.

"There is nothing more important than the safety of our children," Feiner says.

Another safety feature the town is pursuing is the installation of pedestrian activated crosswalk lights. One has been installed at East Hartsdale Avenue and another, just installed at Seely Place and Ardsley Road, includes a blinking crosswalk light.

The Seely Place and Ardsley Road crosswalk is very popular with young children who now use the new sidewalk

to walk to the Seely Place School. The light blinks when one crosses and alerts motorists to the pedestrians. Kids are being taught to push the button and the perception is that more children are walking to school.

Feiner says he has discussed with the Chief of Police the addition of another crossing light on Hillside near the Bailey School. The request is being sent to Albany for authorization.

A pedestrian-activated crosswalk light crossing Edgemont Road and Crane's pond should be installed shortly, Feiner advises and he asks residents to come forward with suggestions for more crossing light locations. ## Westchester County Joins Sustainable Westchester Consortium

Westchester County under the leadership of County Executive Rob Astorino joined a bipartisan group of elected officials and environmental leaders last week to announce that the county has entered into an official partnership with Sustainable Westchester, a consortium of local governments that facilitates green initiatives like Solarize Westchester, Community Choice Aggregation and the Municipal Solar Buyers Group.

"Westchester has long had a bipartisan tradition of protecting our environment and I'm proud to have built upon this legacy," Astorino said. "With the county joining Sustainable Westchester, we have new partners and collaborators, and the initiatives we'll be undertaking will continue to conserve and strengthen our

natural resources and environment for current and future generations."

Solarize Westchester provides residents and small businesses in select municipalities with discounted solar panels and installation. Through programs like Solarize Westchester and the county's sales tax exemption for solar panels, installations in the county have dramatically risen from around 100 in 2010 to just over 1,200 last year. Astorino touted these stats, in addition to record recycling rates and initiatives that encourage sustainable development, investment in open space and conservation, and promote a spirit of stewardship over the county's natural environment.

Westchester County and Sustainable Westchester entered into an official partnership.

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# Woman's Club of White Plains Awards New Scholarship to WPHS Student

The Woman's Club of White Plains held its Annual Scholarship Luncheon & Fashion Show at the CV Rich Mansion on Ridgeway on May 20th. A rain-free day allowed guests to enjoy the beautiful house as well as the gardens. This year's luncheon will enable the Woman's Club to grant scholarships to 18 deserving White Plains students, continuing a tradition at the Woman's Club which goes back 65 years.

The highlight of this year's event was the awarding of the first Belle Knight Memorial Scholarship. Belle Knight was the first president of the Woman's Club of White Plains, serving from 1916-1918. Ms. Knight was passionately involved in her community serving with the Red Cross, the suffrage movement, League of Women Voters, Daughters of the American Revolution and the Auxiliary of the YWCA. During WWI, she raised money for the war effort and collected over 4000 lbs. of clothing, which was sent to refugees. In 1920, Ms. Knight was the first woman elected to the Common Council of the City of White Plains and is known as the mother of the Community Chest (now United Way) for bringing it to White Plains.

Maryann Martin, president of the Woman's Club of White Plains Foundation said, "We are excited to be able to present

# Greenburgh Man Sentenced to 12 Years for Attempted Rape and Assault

Juan Sumba Duchi (DOB 4/8/84) of Greenburgh, was sentenced by Judge Barbara Zambelli to 12 years in state prison after being found guilty by a jury of one count of Attempted Rape in the First Degree, a class "C" Felony; one count of Assault in the Second Degree, a class "D" Felony; and one count of Assault in the Third Degree, a class "A" Misdemeanor.

On or about Dec. 22, 2015, at approximately 10 p.m., the defendant drove his

ex-girlfriend, in his vehicle to an isolated parking lot located at 228 Fisher Avenue, in the City of White Plains.

Once in the parking lot, the defendant demanded that the victim have sex with him. When the victim refused and begged the defendant to take her home, the defendant became enraged and attacked her, breaking her nose and then attempting to rape her in the car. The victim fought the defendant off and managed to get out from under him escaping from the vehicle.

The defendant then set upon the victim again, kicking and punching her while she lay on the ground. While the defendant stomped on her, he broke her collarbone. A passerby heard the victim's screams and called 911. Two other people

who were in the vicinity came to the victim's aid and pulled the defendant off of her. The police arrived within minutes and the defendant was apprehended at the scene.

As part of the sentence, the defendant must register as a sex offender prior to his release from prison.

Assistant District Attorney Joyce Miller of the Special Prosecutions Division prosecuted the case.

# Road Rage Incident Leads to Fatal Stabbing on Taconic

A Dutchess County man was charged with manslaughter after he allegedly stabbed a Hartsdale man to death Saturday night on the Taconic State Parkway following a road rage incident.

State police said Sunday that Daniel Siino, 28, was discovered in his vehicle with stab wounds to the chest at about 10:30 p.m. At some point, Siino encountered Christian Walczyk, 21, of Pleasant Valley and was fatally stabbed, police said.

According to police, Siino returned to his vehicle and his passenger began driving him to the hospital while contacting 911. EMS and state troopers located the car and provided aid to Siino. He was taken to Westchester Medical Center in Valhalla where he was pronounced dead.

Walczyk, who had left the scene, called 911 and was found nearby. He was taken into custody without incident, police said, and charged with first-degree manslaughter, a Class B felony. Walczyk was arraigned in Mount Pleasant Town Court and is being held without bail at the Westchester County Jail.

State police were assisted by the Town of Mount Pleasant and Village of

Briarcliff Manor police departments and the Westchester County district attorney's office.

Police have requested that any witnesses to the incident contact state police at 914-769-2600. All calls will be kept confidential.


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
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## White Plains Water Upgrades Causing Greenburgh Traffic Problems

## Ridgeway Road Paving Week of May 29th

The White Plains Department of Public Works has scheduled repaving of Ridgeway from Mamaroneck Avenue to Old Mamaroneck Road, weather permitting during the week of May 29th. Street parking will be temporarily

suspended between the hours of 6 a.m. and 7 p.m. Please move vehicles to adjacent streets before the start of work at 7 a.m. Access to the road will be severely limited during the day. All parking restrictions will remain in effect.

Residents are asked to watch for detours and road closures.

Resurfacing of the roadway will take place in two phases. The first phase will remove and replace the asphalt surface, and phase 2, which will follow approximately two weeks later will both seal and provide a smooth surface.

## Charlie William Bevier

Charlie William Bevier, 57, of White Plains, passed away suddenly on May 23. He was born in Kingston, NY, to Louis and Marguerite Bevier. He began running competitively when he was 13-years-old



and excelled in track-and-field in both middle and high school. His athletic success secured him a full scholarship to Syracuse University, where he was an All-American for four years and set a record in the 10,000m run and the 4x1600 yd. relay. Post-college, he was nationally ranked amongst the top ten runners in the United States in the 10,000m and qualified for the Olympic trials in 1984, 1988 and 1992. He holds the course record in Van Cortlandt Park in the five-mile race. After his competitive career concluded, he continued to be an avid runner for the rest of his life.

Charlie attained his bachelor's degree in social work from Syracuse in 1982. He joined Lifting Up Westchester in 1988, went on to become a case manager, and ultimately worked his way up to the position of Director of Shelter Outreach and Homeless Services. Over his nearly thirty-year career, he was devoted to the care and protection of homeless individuals and was influential in inspiring many residents to overcome homelessness and achieve independence and success. He was recognized by the National Council on Alcoholism with an award for his work with the homeless population in Westchester County. He was widely respected and admired by his colleagues for his dedication and humanitarianism.

His colleagues at Lifting Up Westchester said: "Charlie was one of the original staff members when Open Arms was established in 1989 and since then has influenced every aspect of Lifting Up Westchester as a dedicated employee, committed supervisor, loyal colleague, mentor, friend and member of the LUW family. As importantly, he has served countless men and women in our community, with kindness and patience and a sincere belief in their

potential. Charlie always had a smile for everyone, was easy to talk to, and always willing to help anyone in need. He has touched so many people and will truly be missed both inside and outside the walls of Lifting Up Westchester."

Charlie was a passionate fan of Syracuse University sports along with college and professional basketball. He was an enthusiastic lover of animals and the outdoors. He enjoyed frequent trips to his hometown of New Paltz, NY.

Charlie is survived by his fiancée and long-time companion Liliane Drago of White Plains; her two children, Lauren and Michael; sister Shirley Bevier-Simpson and her husband Leon Simpson of Tilson, NY; brother Louie Bevier of Woodstock, NY; brother Benjamin "Bennie" Bevier of Kingston, NY; brother Alfred Bevier and his partner Tonja Williams of Walkill, NY; sister Jessie Bevier McKoy and her husband Roosevelt McKoy of New York, NY; brother Henry Bevier of Hanover, NJ; countless nieces and nephews; and all of the people whose lives he touched.



For this article the author will digress from the usual stoic political/social commentary to a personal nostalgic topic of lighter fare.

Many of the folk/rock songs of the sixties shared angst with the rebellious youth of the time, often being its voice. What the youth of the sixties and the youth of all eras share in common are the songs that mark special rites of passage. For some of us fledgling Hippies of the day, The Byrds' rendition of "Mr. Tambourine Man" was one such song. The song was the perfect collaboration of Bob Dylan's poetic and political lyrics with the innovative guitar work of Roger McGuinn and his electric 12-string Rickenbacker guitar. For those of us aspiring to be guitarists, the 12 string really upped the ante - blistering would be an understatement, maybe callous is a better choice of words.

On one rainy Saturday afternoon on a spring day in 1967, I opted to cure my boredom by attending the double-feature horror matinee at the Embassy Theater in Port Chester. Well, actually, practicing bar chords on my cheap acoustic 12-string was taking a toll on my patience, not to mention my ego. For a price of 65 cents it was not a bad deal, and in hindsight a rather fortuitous decision.

I approached the dark and menacing ticket booth, expecting to see the phantom

of the opera selling tickets behind the dark cage. I slipped my ten-dollar bill under the cage and waited for my change. As I peered into the dark booth my eyes met the blue eyes of a rather cute blonde-haired girl. With a smile she said, "Cool clothes!" I guess I did look cool with my Beatle boots, bellbottom jeans, tie-died t-shirt and long hair - it was approaching my ear lobes - and, off course, my Roger McGuinn granny glasses. She woke me from my silent reverie by asking, "Like hey man, do you dig The Byrds?" I thought, "Like cool," she must be psychic or something, and hopefully she's not reading my mind.

"What's your name? Do you play the guitar?" she asked.

In a confident tone that hid my inner trepidation, I answered, "Yes I do" and whispered my name.

"Why this is really good Karma man, can you play Mr. Tambourine Man?" I responded with reserved honesty, "like yeah no problem, piece of cake."

"Like really groovy," she said. "Can you meet me at my bus stop Monday afternoon, at the corner of Irving Avenue and North Regent at about three o'clock?" She smiled with every word. "I go to school in White Plains. You can walk me home. Bring your guitar and don't worry about meeting my parents, they don't return from work until around seven-ish."

"My lucky day," I thought, for sure my prayers were being answered.

"No problem, see you then, rain or shine," I said.

After the show I walked past the ticket window. We both flashed the peace sign, "See you Monday." Monday seemed like an eternity away.

Arriving home from school on Monday, I hid my baseball glove, and unbeknownst to my parents, made the decision not to compete in the team tryouts. I grabbed my 12-string acoustic guitar along with a few albums, sheet music and my granny glasses, and ran to the bus stop. Standing at the street corner, my five-minute wait seemed like an eternity. I prayed the local "Greasers" would not mug me.

My date looked quite cute getting off the bus. Her smile was electrifying. On the walk to her house, I had to navigate the painful conundrum of carrying my guitar, albums and sheet music and still hold her hand.

Arriving at her home, I put down my guitar to ease the pain in my aching arm - the things we do for love. She looked at me with those blue eyes and asked for a serenade. She proved to be quite the inspiration as I ripped through the opening guitar solo, followed by the bar chords. It hit the mark; we never made it to the third verse. In what seemed like a few moments we heard her parent's car pull up in the driveway and I was out the back door trying to put my disheveled self together.

Arriving home, I quickly hid my guitar, picked up my baseball glove, and tried to look presentable. As I entered the living room, my parent's inquired, "How did you do? Looks like you had quite a workout

at baseball practice." Well, I couldn't lie; Boy Scout's Honor and all. "Not only did I make it to first base, I actually scored," I said. My parents were as impressed as they were gullible. They even bought me a new baseball glove the next day.

For my friend and I, the afternoon rendezvous lasted well into the summer, until autumn's first chill separated us like leaves falling from a golden tree.

Fifty years have passed. I am divorced and retired with two grown daughters of my own. I now have the time to play my electric 12-string Rickenbacker guitar, and have mastered the bar chords and timeless guitar solos better than I have mastered the art of aging. In the autumn of my life, I find myself at times reflecting on this youthful interlude with fond memories as I drive past the now defunct Embassy Theater, listening to the Byrds' CD.

In hindsight, I realize this was more than just a youthful rite of passage, or in sixties parlance, rather good Karma. In the folly of my youth I acquired maturity's wisdom to know that I was not born to be an athlete. It set my life compass to seek the shores of academics, poetry, music, and the arts, making me the existential philosopher and romantic I am today. I believe Bob Dylan's lyrics sum it up best: "Ah, but I was so much older then, I'm younger than that now."

With no regrets.



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# Tradition and Science Strive to Engage and Then Imitate Nature

Last week I reported on devastating weather in western Europe that severely impacted the potential yield of 2017 grape crops.

Throughout France and Italy, 20 to 50 percent of this year's potential crop may be lost.

The devastation took place unexpectedly and quickly. In only two days, in just a few morning hours, frost hit the affected vineyards, wreaking havoc on emerging vine shoots and buds. Earlier in the month, hailstorms, lasting

mere minutes, exacted similar damage in several regions, including the Champagne and Burgundy regions of France.

This is another example of nature's affinity for the element of misdirection: Vineyard owners in Bordeaux were glowing in the gentleness of an early warm, spring this year; grapevines had begun to produce shoots and buds up to two weeks earlier than normal, portending a strong and longer growing season. Ironically, in a typical year the frost would have occurred when grapevines were still hibernating and buds had not yet emerged. *Sacré bleu*, what happened to the beneficence of nature?

This week I'm focusing on those means

that man has devised and developed to live in harmony with nature and to attempt to appease her with natural measures to mitigate and minimize the destruction wrought by frost and hailstorms.

The traditional means include:

1. Fire. What better way to combat 20-degree weather in the vineyard than with heat? One traditional frost-preventive method is to place hundreds of oil-burning heaters strategically throughout the vineyards. Another is to transport large drums filled with oil into the vineyards and ignite them. The problem this year is that the early morning frosts hit so quickly and without warning that grape growers were caught

off-guard.

2. Water. Where irrigation sprinklers are available, grape growers spray water on their grapevines. This creates a layer of ice as the water freezes, insulating the tender shoots and buds. This method is employed extensively in the citrus orchards of Florida.

3. Wind. Giant wind machines are brought into the vineyards to circulate the air and prevent frost. Financially, this is not very practical; and electricity is not always readily available to power the fans.

In recent years, helicopters have been employed to circulate and warm vineyard air. But not this year. In Bordeaux, for example, local laws prevent air traffic before 6:30 a.m. Wily nature decided to strike a few hours before that, wreaking havoc in a matter of minutes.

On to the newest developments in combating frost: Why battle nature when you can become nature?

Glenn McGourty, a farm adviser at the University of California Cooperative Extension, and Professor Steve Lindow, a plant pathologist at the University of California-Berkeley, are researching novel approaches to dealing with frost at the molecular level, rather than the macro level.

Their approaches are organic in nature. In one project, they have isolated "ice nucleating bacteria on the leaves of vegetation, which act as nuclei for formation of ice crystals from moisture in the air." These bacteria live in the molecular structure of the shoots and buds and then destroy their hosts. The goal? Displace the ice-forming bacteria with a friendly strain. The intended result? Grapevines that are not susceptible to frost. This "biopesticide" may be the ultimate answer to frost resistance for organic vineyard owners. But are they creating a new solution or mimicking nature?

As for the devastating hailstorms mentioned above, man has been forced to live with their randomness and devastation – until recently. Scientists have sought the ultimate organic solution: man-made climate change is now a reality.

Beginning this year, at the threat of a hailstorm, grape growers in Burgundy will launch a "hailstorm shield." As reported by the British newspaper The Telegraph, a specific geographic area "will be protected by a network of 125 ground generators that cause tiny particles of silver iodide to rise to the clouds above, where they stop the formation of hail stones."

Man rises to nature's challenges at every turn. Science in the 21st century strives to imitate nature rather than engage her. Will this new "God-like" endeavor be successful? Perhaps, but always beware of nature's scorn.

For Charlie Lagond, Co-founder and Musical Director of Lagond Music School in Elmsford, music has been a life-long passion and the work of his soul.

The not-for-profit music school has been a staple in Westchester for the past

15 years, started in an attic in White Plains with about 35 private students, mostly kids.

Over time, Charlie expanded into a new and larger space and began to diversify, welcoming adults to his growing group of student musicians.

Just two months ago he took another step to reach out to musicians all over Westchester County and beyond, hoping to attract the broader musical community with weekly adult jam sessions – a place where passionate musicians can congregate, kick back, grab a drink and jam with well-known guest artists.

The weekly jam sessions take

place Sunday nights at The Haven at Lagond, a rehearsal and performance space featuring two fully equipped professional soundstages located on the main floor of Lagond Studios. Each week spotlights a different genre and well known guest musicians. Anyone with a desire to play, age 18 and older, can join the jam on stage and sit in with peers.

"It's a great opportunity to network, to meet and play with professional musicians," Charlie told The White Plains Examiner during a recent interview. He welcomes practicing and professional musicians of every skill level to bring their instruments and participate in the interactive sessions.

"Our goal is to cultivate a musical haven for anyone who wants to express their love for music and their dedication to furthering their skills," Charlie adds.

In the few weeks since the jams started a few local musicians have found work after meeting and playing with professionals during the sessions. And musicians have discovered they can use the Lagond facility as a resource.

With over 35 years experience as a professional musician, Charlie can call on some distinguished names in the field and they are happy to show up at the Sunday jams. For many years he toured, performing around the world

with artists including Chet Baker, Woody Herman, Buddy Rich, Bernard Purdie, Chuck Mangione, The Jackson Five, the Temptations, Natalie Cole, and Kid Creole & the Coconuts, with whom he has performed at several presidential inaugural balls and at a Command Performance by request of Princess Diana. He also spent time working on Broadway and in television and film. Charlie is a strong believer in the power of live performance. "Music is intended to be performed live," he says.

Charlie, who began his career in music at the age of nine, playing the clarinet, begins each Sunday jam with a stage performance featuring the night's special guest and a house band. "This sets the mood," Charlie says. "Then depending on the type of music being played, we will invite a guitar player to the stage, for example, who will play with the professional musicians."

Charlie controls the flow of musicians on and off the stage during the jam. Musicians are welcomed to perform on a first come, first served basis.


There is no fee to perform and no fee for spectators, who are welcome. Refreshments and drinks from the bar do carry a price, with all proceeds going to the not-for-profit educational organization.

Different music genres are featured on a regular monthly schedule. There is no jam on the first Sunday of the month, and no jam if a month has a fifth Sunday.

Rock/Jamband is featured every second Sunday; Jazz/Latin on third Sundays; and Funk/Soul on fourth Sundays.






It has not been an easy season for the University of Richmond Baseball Team. The Spiders did not make the Atlantic 10 Conference Playoffs this season, while finishing with a dismal 17-36 overall and 6-17, A-10 record.

Nonetheless, on Thursday, May 18, as the Spiders closed out their 2017 season with a three-game home series against this year's A-10 League Champs, Virginia Commonwealth University, they took the field still fighting and maintaining their dignity.

Leading that fight on-and-off the field for the NCAA Division 1 Richmond

Adams was also a two-year Team Captain when he played for the Tigers under Head Coach Marcel Galligani. Adams, while finishing his junior year at the University of Richmond, upheld the team-first foundation he learned at WPHS. This year, Adams received the ultimate compliment from his college teammates, when he was elected a Team Captain of the NCAA Division 1 University of Richmond Baseball Team.

"Kyle is a leader and we put it to the players to vote for him. He talks a little bit and he will get on somebody and that is what we are looking for," said Spiders Head Coach Tracy Woodson.

Spiders was Kyle Adams, a 2013 graduate of White Plains High School. During his high school career, Adams was selected to the 2013 All-New York State Team and was a three-time All-League and two-time All Section Honoree, as well as being selected the 2012 White Plains Examiner WPHS Spring Male Athlete of the Year.

Adams did not have as remarkable a season in 2017 as he did his first two seasons with the Spiders. But he assumed his roll as Captain as it is meant to be interpreted, which is to lead your team regardless of wins, losses or adversity.

Adams played in 50 of 53 games this season and started 47 games. The Spiders

junior leftfielder batted .250 with 10 doubles, 25 RBIs, 22 walks and maintained a .975 fielding percentage.

This year's statistics compared pale to his freshman and sophomore years. Adams batted .321, while starting 48 games last season, with 15 doubles, three homeruns, 33 RBIs and 28 walks with a .425 on-base percentage. Adams was selected to the A-10 All-Rookie Team his freshman season, while batting .343, which was tops for A-10 Rookies.

But despite, the Spider's struggles, which of course affected Adams struggles this season, there was the White Plains native going 2-for-4 and running his hardest to score a run against VCU on May 18, while maintaining his positive attitude.

"It is unbelievable where I am at today. I talk to my Dad about it all the time, looking back at all the showcases we went to in the past and to see how far I have come with some success. I worked hard everyday to have this opportunity and I do not take it for granted," said Adams.

Adams understands quite well what a privilege it is just to be playing Division 1 Baseball at a major University, let alone being named Captain of the team. When the Spiders were feeling down regarding this season, through his own fruition and finances he made rubber bracelets, inscribed "Positive Vibes-32 Strong" and gave one to each of his teammates, coaches and support staff to lift their spirits and maintain unity among the team.

"We have had a tough year with some adversity on and off the field. As one of our Captains, Kyle organized these special bracelets that he had made and that is a testament to just how important this program is to him and the type of person

he is," acknowledged Spiders Assistant Coach Nate Mulberg.

However, Adams comes from a family with an array of athletic leaders. His mother Sue is a legendary WPHS Basketball Coach, who won four consecutive Section 1 Championships. His father Bob is an NCAA Division 1 Referee and former star basketball player at Colgate University. His sister Kim played on those Tigers teams her mother coached and is an accomplished swimmer, who played basketball at University of Pennsylvania and his brother Ryan played basketball for WPHS and Ursinus College.

Also, Kyle's Uncle Bill Adams, who was present with Kyle's father Bob at Pitt Field for the last series of the season, is an Executive for New Era Caps and outfits the head-wear for the Spiders. Bill Adams was also a Minor League player in the San Francisco Giants organization.

Kyle Adams is eligible for the MLB Draft this season and will be a senior at the University of Richmond in September. Regardless, of what happens in the Draft or next season as Adams concludes his college-career at Richmond, he will always regard his playing days at WPHS as the proliferation of his talent.

"I stay in touch with Marcel. He was one of the best coaches that I ever had, who always believed in me and always knew what I was capable of," said Adams. "It is amazing, I could not be more proud of him," said Galligani. "As I have said to our players, when you leave this baseball program you represent this program. It makes me proud to see the wonderful things Kyle has accomplished," said Galligani, who coached Adams at WPHS for three years.

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**EXAMINER SPORTS****Tigers Baseball Season Ends in 9-inning Pitchers Duel in Section 1 Finals****By Albert Coqueran**

The White Plains High School Baseball Team can hold their heads high. The Tigers 2017 season ended with a 2-0 loss in nine innings to Arlington High School at Dutchess Stadium, after reaching the Section 1 Championship Game for the first time since 1979.

Tigers' senior pitcher Gehrig Hauser pitched the game of his life but was outdueled by Admirals senior pitcher Rob Fratarcangeli.

Hauser stifled the Admirals line-up throughout the game while striking out 12, walking none and allowing only three hits until the ninth inning. The 10th seeded Admirals (15-8) got another three hits off Hauser in the top of the ninth, including a game-winning two-run triple by Mike Bulgia, which gave the Admirals their first Section 1 Championship since 2013.

Fratarcangeli finished the extra innings game for the nine-inning complete game win. The Admirals senior gave up five hits, three walks and struck-out seven Tigers. Nonetheless, Fratarcangeli's only advantages over Hauser in this pitching duel was that he stranded nine Tigers on base and his team got the big hit from Bulgia in the game.

The fifth seeded Tigers (16-8) just could not get that key hit against the Admirals, as they did in their Section 1 Semifinals win over ninth-seeded Mahopac High School, on Wednesday, May 24, at WPHS.

Tigers catcher Matt Dorchak had two RBI singles, including a hit-and-run called by Head Coach Marcel Galligani that scored a run in the fifth inning. First baseman Spencer Lodes slammed a two-run homerun over the centerfield fence in

the sixth inning, which led to an 8-0 win for the Tigers.

But these key hits just did not come for White Plains against the Admirals in the Section 1 AA Championship game. The Tigers stranded runners on second and third base in the second inning and had two runners on base and nobody out in the fourth inning but were blanked by Fratarcangeli and good defense by the Admirals.

"I felt good the whole way. I knew my pitch count was around 120, but I felt good, I did not want to be taken out," said Fratarcangeli, who was the MVP of the Championship Game. Admirals Head Coach Darrell Flynn said of Hauser's

118-pitch performance for the Tigers. "That pitcher, man, you have to give it up to him. He had us confused all day. We were finally able to get to him in the ninth," said Flynn.

"If I would have walked out to that mound to take him out of that game, we

would have had a fist fight," commented Galligani, regarding Hauser. "He was not going to let me take him out of that game and by the way he was throwing, I was not going to take him out. Gehrig was throwing great, he was shutting them down," said the Tigers Head Coach.

Galligani and the 2017 Tigers advanced the White Plains High School Varsity Baseball Program to the Section 1 Finals for the first time since 1979. Moreover, they were maybe a hit or a pitch away from capturing the AA Title. "I am proud of these guys. I told them before we hit in that last at bat, that regardless of the result that I loved them and was proud of them," said Galligani.
